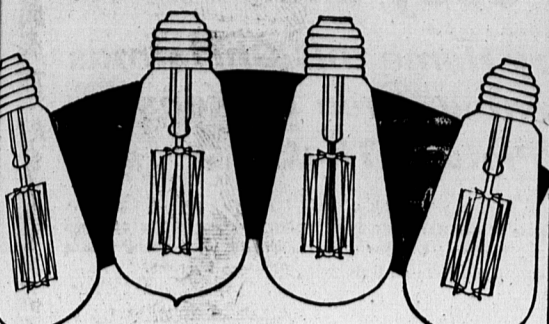

Belfast Public Hall

The outer construction of the new public hall, which the Belfast citizens, together with the financial assistance of other interested friends, are erecting, is rapidly nearing completion. The mild open weather of the recent weeks has aided materially in the progress of the work, which under the capable superintendence of Mr. Norman Gillis has made most gratifying progress and will in all probability be ready for occupation before Christmas. Mr. Gillis has had several expert carpenters working under his direction and much of the shingling and other work has been done by a number of those public spirited citizens who are always ready to give their assistance as voluntary labor. The roof and outer walls are all complete, the chimney is erected and it only remains for the windows and doors will be in place; then the interior without dependence upon the weather will be finished as far as it is intended to go at present.

The building is located in Eldon on the corner lot angle-wise across the road from the store of the late A. D. Ross. It is 70 feet by 32 feet. At the east end 10 feet is being partitioned off a part of which will be used as a kitchen or social fundations at which refreshments are served and the remainder which may be used as dressing rooms for other forms of entertainment. In front of that will be a stage 15 feet in width leaving the main body of the hall of 45 feet by 32 feet for seating capacity which will accommodate upwards of 300 people. The main entrance is in the west end fronting to the street. There is a side door on the south immediately at the side of the stage which can be used for ingress in case of necessity. The building itself has a 12 foot eave and a gable roof, which thus leaves a most suitable hall in the upper story, but which however will not be available until such time as the interior can be finished complete.

The public of the Belfast district are indeed fortunate in being able to get such a splendid building so far erected as to be ready for occupation and they are very thankful and wish now to take this opportunity of publicly thanking all those friends who assisted so liberally, at their open-air tea-party last July, in the consummation of this work.

The availability of such a hall in the district has been a long felt want and will now be an asset to the neighborhood for we will have a public hall to which we shall be apt to invite the most fastidious speaker, and the most tedious building in which it will be a pleasure to arrange for concerts and other forms of entertainment. Country people are sometimes at a disadvantage in their opportunity to receive the best that is going in the form of intellectual entertainment but now there can be no intellectual treat pass by the want of a suitable public hall.
