### AUTUMN.

"Lo! sun-browed Autumn comes with cheeks aglow

Yes, this is Autumn, and truly she has brought a rich reward to honest toil. Upon the farmers of this favored Province she has bestowed a bounteous harvest.

The vivid stories of success in the far away West may cause some of us to disregard the riches at our feet, but the experience of many years has proven that in this Province we may depend upon a successful harvesting. We need not dread that an untimely blizzard may sweep down our ripened grain, and leave in ruin the result of all our labor. This is a Province that is dependable.

Our fisheries have been very successful. Lobsters in particular have formed a source of great profit. The fishing industry is becoming more important yearly, and its various branches will employ and enrich many of our people.

In our orchards the magic of the fall has transformed the blossoms into ripened fruit. This was an off year for nearly all kinds of fruit; though in some sections trees have borne generously.

The grain and roots crops are both of more than ordinary value, and our farmers are in even a better financial position than usual. Cheese, of which a great deal has been manufactured has maintained a high price all summer and is now soaring above the twelve cent mark.

With peace and plenty within our bounds our population has one only source of discontent, and that is the fact that another winter is approaching with no prospect of better means of communication with the outer world than has existed during other winters. We have had sad experience of how inadequate are they. With the Tunnel how changed would be our circumstances. Let us hope, for often have we prayed.

Though Spring may gladden us [with sweet deliverance from Winter's thrall, and Summer surfeit us with flowers; yet Autumn is the season of contentment. When Nature rests and in the glow of Autumn's sun the fields are golden and the woodlands rich in glorious hues we feel that living is a joy. The ozone-laden atmosphere has that clear light that only Autumn owns.

This is the season for the Nature lover to study Nature's mysteries.

The simplest little weed that grows along the way shows cleverer designing than any of man's masterpieces. Take for instance a few of the devices that plants have for scattering their seeds. The fall dandelion and many others have balloons of silky fibres to waft their seeds to the distant fields. The Bur Marigold has its seeds crowned with arms that attach them to any passing animals. The Touch-me-not has an elastic pod that in bursting scatters its seed far and wide. On every side is evidence of the wise provision that nature is making for the carrying out of her work in the year that will follow after the coming winter.

### CHURCH UNION.

Rev. Geo. Steel of Bedouque who is a member of the General Committee with whom rests the considering and deciding of questions in relation to the proposed Union of the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational Churches of Canada and Newfoundland, was the other day interviewed on his way home from Toronto, where he had been attending a meeting of the Committee.

The meeting lasted for five days and there were three sessions each day. Each morning there was a united committee meeting; in the afternoon the sub-committees held meetings and the evenings were devoted to denominational rallies.

Mr. Steel said that it had been a great pleasure to him to be present at the meeting, apart from the fact that he is an enthusiastic worker in favor of the movement and felt that a great deal has been accomplished. It was a valued privilege to be one of such a large and representative gathering of his fellow workers. He said the proceedings at all the meetings had been marked by the most gratifying frankness and cordiality. Every subject of importance in connection with the union of the churches has been discussed with the greatest freedom and affability.

The union of the churches is a great undertaking and one which must be carefully considered from every possible standpoint. The possibilities are far-reaching and of vital importance to the religious world. Mr. Steel's opinion is that the union is practicable and that it is quite probable that it is only a matter of time when it will take place.

That Mr. Steel's ideas are shared by his brothers of the committee is shown by the fact that at the last session a resolution was passed by a standing vote, that the union was deemed practicable by the committee. This is considered a great step toward the consummation of the union as it is an indication that the members will go back to their fields of labor throughout the Dominion with the union principle at heart.
