WHAT A TRUST MAY DO.

The struggle between the great steel trust on the one hand and organized labor on the other has served to bring into relief the fact that the billion dollar trust possesses a great but invidious power which it has yet in reserve. For instance it can close any one or more of its great industrial plants, and carry on its business of supplying the market without inconvenience from the closing. It can make the closure permanent, and might even find it to its interest to do so, concentrating its work at the more advantageous centres, and perhaps dismantling the works which were found least profitable to operate.

Around one of these great industries it may be that a city has grown up through a period of years and tens of thousands of work-people and their dependants have established their homes there. Such plants constitute in many cases the main support of the town. We have all read of the wide-spread suffering among employees, their wives and families and among merchants who catered to their wants when a prolonged strike has occurred in the past. Before the "trust" era was ushered in the plants were owned individually, and when a strike was over business was resumed at the old stand and matters went on much as before. The case will be far different when the United States Steel Corporation exercises its power and both closes and dismantles some vast industry permanently. That would mean ruin in the case of many towns.

It is certain that the great Steel Trust possesses this power. It is quite clear that it may be to its interest to exercise the power which it possesses in that regard. And it will be difficult to find any adequate remedy for the blow when it falls. New industries upon a vast scale cannot be called up in a day, even where capital stands ready for the venture. But capital will be timid of entering upon competition with a trust whose means are fabulous. A very little reflection will show how hopeless, in face of these conditions would be the case of the workers. The fact is that one of the great trusts has the power to bring about widespread disaster, not only to thousands of workers, but to entire towns and cities. The trust is conscious of its power. It will be guided by selfish interests and those may—and sometimes must prompt the management to the exercise of that power along the lines we have indicated. When the time comes there will be a huge struggle against the trusts, a struggle that will shake the industrial world to its centre.

Worth Weight in Gold.

An English paper calculating the Boer losses and the cost of the South African war, arrives at the result that each Boer killed, wounded and captured, for the six months ending June 30, was literally worth his weight in gold. Taking the average weight of each Boer, young and old, at 150 pounds, the value of gold at \$20 an ounce, the cost of each is \$49,000. The expenditure during those six months was over \$250,000,000. In former wars it used to be calculated how many times his weight in lead it took to kill a man, but we have gone ahead on that. The weight in gold is the new standard.

Constitution Defeats Columbia.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—The proposed cup defender Constitution drifted across the finish line late yesterday afternoon on a winner over last year's defender, the Columbia, by thirty-one minutes and twenty three seconds. This difference in the time however, does not represent the difference in space between the two yachts, for a very large part of the big margin time was entirely due to a fluke in the air while the boats were sailing the second round of the triangular course of 75 miles.
