 In Chicago
 (Canadian Press)
 CHICAGO, Sept. 25 - A bonafide snowstorm, the first September flurry on record, pelted Chicago for a few minutes today. The caprice of nature brought stenographers and presidents to open windows and sent noon day crowds scurrying indoors. Five minutes later the sun was shining and the weather bureau prophesied that it would not happen again soon.

RAILWAY AUTHORITIES DISAGREE
 LONDON, Sept. 25 - Railway authorities consulted concerning the article published by Dr. Hewlett Johnson, dean of Manchester, entitled "Why I Like the Road" criticizing the railways, did not agree with his indictments of uncleanliness and regarded his suggestions for electric traction and smokeless fuel as at present impracticable.
 Dr. Johnson stated in his article that two main factors made him choose the road, one was the joy of seeing more of England the other was the prospect of a journey in cleanliness and fresh air. Three methods of obtaining clean travel were before the railway companies - the electric railway, the Diesel electric train, and the promise of smokeless fuels such as the low temperature carbonization products.
 "I do not see why there should necessarily be dirt in a railway carriage," said an official of the Railway Companies' Association. "You can close the windows, and there are ventilators in the carriages to admit fresh air. The speed of the train usually carries away the engine smoke before it reaches the second carriage. To introduce electricity over a whole railway system is hardly practicable now, particularly in view of the economy campaign."
 "Look," he added, "at hundreds of thousands of locomotives that would have to be scrapped in addition to the cost of laying down electric generating plant. Electrically driven trains would run into millions of pounds."
 "Already the railway companies are doing all they can by electrifying suburban services, as witness the Southern Railway's ambitious scheme. The companies are always open to experiment and questions have to be related to administration as a whole and to the facts of the present situation."
 "Trains are far more comfortable than charabancs. On a raised rail track you get a finer panoramic view of the country than if you speed between high hedges. On a train you can get a square meal. Then what about the dust and the smell of petrol on the roads?"
 "It is easy for the dust of Manchester," was another comment on another railway authority, "to suggest that the railway companies should scrap their existing system in order to get rid of a dirt which has gone on for 100 years."
 "We only wish we could electrify the railways, but finance is government's problem."
 "As to the adoption of smokeless fuel, that is entirely a matter for experiment, and you can take it that the railways are not going to be slow in this direction."

BALDWIN CHATS WITH POINCARRE ON MODERN DRAMA ONLY
 PARIS, Sept. 25 - Statesmen conferring find many things to talk about besides affairs of Government, and it is not always the weightiest questions that take up their discussions. Thus, when Premier Baldwin met Poincarre today with Premier Poincarre, in the first meeting of the two statesmen in many months, the conversation did not turn upon the Anglo-French naval understanding, nor the treaty of Paris, nor continental political problems. It turned, instead, on the drama.
 For during the entire luncheon, almost the sole topic of conversation was the play by Maurice Rostand, entitled "Napoleon IV." Mr. Baldwin pointed out that certain implications in this play, now running at a Boulevard theatre, were extremely painful and objectionable to the highest circles in England and the talk went from the play to the historic circumstances of the death of the young son of Napoleon III, while in the British army, fighting Zulul in South Africa.
 During the luncheon, the Premier exchanged only a few sentences not related to the subject, and it could not be learned that they at any time discussed any of the supposedly momentous questions their two Chancellories are engaged in negotiating.

SIR OLIVER ON SPACE
 (By British United Press)
 LONDON, September, 25 - Matter is animate, but I believe that other space is full of animate life and mind, which sometimes lives in matter for a little while and then goes back into space. In due time the dust returns to earth and the spirit goes back to God who gave it.
 Sir Oliver Lodge, the famous scientist, made this declaration in preaching at Wellington United Free Church recently.
 "No one who specialises in one department," he said, "can expect to cover the whole truth. The mystery of the universe as now conceived by the human mind is overwhelming. This planet is a speck in the vast creation full of law and order.
 When we see rational arrangement in a complete system of law and order in the inorganic world or atoms, comes and sums when we perceive that the laws of light and heat are followed throughout the full extent of the universe, most of us are led to postulate the existence of some great mind which governs and understands it all.
 "The only reason for assuming that life and mind are necessarily associated with matter is because we know them recently we had not known them associated with anything else.
 The only existence we know of at first hand is life in association with matter on the surface of this particular planet but it is quite unlikely that this is the only kind of existence possible.
 "Enlarged science is making us aware that real existence is a much wider and universal thing."
