In referring to the record trip of the Evelyn the St. John's Newfoundland Telegram says:—The clipper schooner Evelyn, Capt. Benoit, which arrived here yesterday from Oporto, made the round trip from this port in 32 days. The ship had a hard time across and was delayed four days off Oporto owing to a heavy freshet in the river. The trip back was made in 14 1/2 days.

THE annual prize speaking of the Rutherford Falls High School took place Wednesday evening March 28, at the Universalist Church. A complete program was well rendered. The prizes, which were sums of money were awarded to the following: first-prize for young ladies was given to Jennie A. McEwen; first for young gentlemen to J. Wilbur Hamilton and second to Louis M. Kidder. (Miss McEwen was formerly a student of Prince Street School.)

THE regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last night. The teachers' reports for last month show the enrollment to be 1339. The average attendance 1120; per centage of attendance, 83. There were 200 cases of tardiness reported and 6 cases of truancy. Number visits to parents 249. Number of cases of corporal punishment 211. Number fell below average in grading 81; number requests to leave school 158. The highest per centage of attendance in West Kent was in Mr. Owen's and Mr. Campbell's departments—each 95; Queen Square School, Miss Fennessey's 97; Prince Street, Mr. Seaman's 92. Miss McKinnon and Mr. Yeo had no cases of tardiness for the month. The chairman of the Committee on fire escapes for the School submitted plans. The matter was deferred until next meeting. After the passing of a number of bills and the discussion of some minor matters the Board adjourned.

THE annual meeting of the National Council of the Women of Canada, which is suggested by the mention of Lady Aberdeen, is to hold its annual meeting in Victoria, B. C., during the month of July. Miss Perrin, sister of the Anglican Bishop of British Columbia, is the president of the Local Council at Victoria, and she is arranging to have much pleasure connected with the meeting as well as the necessary business. There will probably be a number of delegates from Eastern Canada at the meeting and whatever else the object and aim of the Women's Council it must be acknowledged by all thoughtful persons that much national good is achieved by the drawing together of women workers of the different provinces. Nothing will so strongly knit the provinces of this country together as sympathy, and understanding among the women who live in it. It is probable that the delegates and those who attend the meeting will make the long journey over the C. P. R. in a private car, and will stop off at Port Arthur, Rat Portage, Winnipeg Brandon and Regina for visits to Local Councils.

As anticipated Mr. McSwain's paper read before the Natural History and Antiquarian Society last night was an educational treat. The well-known ability and learning of the lecturer and the importance and interest of the subject attracted a large audience which listened to the reader with keen interest and deserved appreciation as he explained the several systems of the classification of birds and made mention of the members of each division of the feathered tribes which are residents or visitors in our Province. The paper abounded in points of interest and covered much more ground than its title expressed. Mr. McSwain proved himself not only an authority upon the subject but a careful and intelligent observer of bird-life. Everyone regretted the termination of the paper, the comparative brevity of which was but partly compensated for by the discussion of it which followed upon the reading. In this discussion Messrs. Newson, C. C. Gardiner, Cotton, Bulman, Watson and Arsenal took part. Messrs. Cotton and Watson proposed and seconded a vote of thanks which was suitably acknowledged by Mr. McSwain. These public meetings of the Society are being appreciated if we may judge from the interest being taken in the educational work which the Society is so generously undertaking for the public good.
