OYSTER SHIPMENTS ARE much heavier — Large quantities of Prince Edward Island oysters are coming into the market, says the St. John Journal. It is estimated that about 6,000 barrels will be the total of this season's shipments from that province, an increase of about 1,300 barrels over the total of 1921. The demand is good in St. John and other cities the price ranging on the Island from \$6 to \$8 a barrel.

"For Brotherhood Among All People"

NEW YORK, Dec. 20—A service of "intercession for brotherhood and fellowship among all people" with representatives of the British, French and the United States governments attending, was held in the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, under the auspices of twenty seven societies and social organizations.

The Right Rev. William T. Manning, Protestant Episcopal Bishop of New York, told the gathering that the need of nations was a "voice in which all can have confidence, because it is known to be generous, just and disinterested."

Woman Kills Man Notifies Family

CHAPLEAU, Ont., Dec. 20—John McKee, aged 42, widower, C. P. R. engineer and prominent citizen of Chapleau for twenty years, is dead, with a bullet through his brain and Mrs. Sadie Connaughton, aged 40, wife of a C. P. R. engineer, is at the district jail in Sudbury, charged with the crime.

Mrs. Connaughton surrendered to the police as soon after police officers could be notified to go to the Connaughton home which detail Mrs. Connaughton arranged by sending a neighbor's boy to notify the officers to come. The tragedy occurred between nine thirty and ten o'clock Saturday night in a shed at the rear of the McKee house, which is directly opposite the Connaughtons.

Mrs. Connaughton is alleged to have entered by the rear door another woman being present. It was while McKee was endeavoring to have her leave the house that Mrs. Connaughton shot him through the brain. She then walked to a neighbor's house and recounted what she had done and asking that the police be notified.

When provincial officer Gorgenson arrived Mrs. Connaughton confessed to domestic misconduct that had existed for some time. She refused to divulge the name of the woman who was present and so far has made the simple explanation that "he ruined my home and he will not ruin another."

Dalhousie Will Send 31 Delegates

HALIFAX, Dec. 19.—Announcement was made yesterday that Dalhousie will be represented by thirty one delegates at the National Conference of Canadian University Students to be held at Toronto from Dec. 28th to Jan. 2nd.

The Conference will be opened on the evening of Dec. 28 by the Governor General, Lord Byng. At his special request the general public is to be excluded from this meeting and it is to be of an informal character. The following days will be devoted to discussion of industrial immigration, international and missionary problems. The morning will be devoted to hearing speeches by prominent national and international leaders in politics and religion, and the afternoon to discussion by the students.

Five hundred student delegates are expected to attend, representing all of the Canadian Universities from Dalhousie at Halifax, to the University of British Columbia at Vancouver. Of this number 72 will go from the Maritime Provinces, apportioned as follows:

Lath Business Is On Increase

FREDERICTON, N. B., Dec. 20—Indications of the boom conditions in the lath business, is the reported decision of the Fraser Companies, Limited, to increase their daily output from 1,000,000 to 1,400,000 daily. The market is largely in the United States.

The Fraser Companies are operating many of their mills this winter for the manufacture of laths, and equipment is being added to several of their plants including the Victoria Mills in Fredericton.

In taking advantage of the hydro electric power available from the Inverness Nipistait Falls near Bathurst, the companies are operating a new lumber mill on the Miramichi, not far from their Nelson plant. Estimates of one hundred and fifty million feet and in addition large quantities of pulpwood for the pulp mills at Edmundston and on the Miramichi are being taken out.

Ludendorff Promises Interview

The former commander-in-chief was particularly bitter against the United States. When told that Americans were keenly interested in Germany, he said that they should mind their own business. Germany did not need them or want them. The United States, he said, had fought for gold, whereas the Germans had fought for the supremacy of the race. Of all Americans he hated the German-Americans the lowest. "We got nothing from them in the war," he said, "and we expect nothing now." He presumed that Ludendorff gives no credit to any friends who did not engage in the actual fighting, and ignores the fact that the German-Americans contributed powerfully to the neutrality of the United States in the early days of the war. Throughout the interview his attitude was that of the soldier who has refused to admit that things have changed, except in the matter of frontiers. He has nothing to apologize for. The same old exploded German theories look good to him now as on the day they were first uttered.

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The Next War.

As regards the Lusitania, he reiterated the charge that the ship carried munitions— "otherwise it would not have blown up so easily"—and he said it was the appearance of the German submarine, Deutschland, in the United States which had finally driven the Americans into the war. Naturally he is bitter against the French and blames them for the fact that he is unable to provide his family with meat more than twice a week. "Germany has been abominably treated," he said, "but there will come a day of reckoning." The Next War, he and his followers believe will be a lightning affair of airplanes and chemicals, fought without the need of calling up national armies. "One army corps should suffice," he said.

Change In Code Of Amateur Tennis

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—Recommendations that the principal tennis championship dates for 1923 be awarded in accordance with last year's schedule and that arrangements be made for the erection of a permanent tennis stadium along the lines of the structure at Wimbledon, England, were outstanding features of the executive committee meeting of the United States Lawn Tennis Association yesterday. A change in the amateur code which would bar from competition any player who permitted moving pictures of himself or herself to be shown for gain or a percentage of the box office receipts also was advocated. All these recommendations will be acted upon at the annual meeting of the association to be held in this city in February.

Sarah Bernhardt Faints At Close Of Rehearsal

PARIS, Dec. 20.—Sarah Bernhardt had a fainting attack at the close of the last rehearsal this afternoon of Sacha Guitry's new play, "Un Sujet de Roman," which was to have been produced to-night with Bernhardt in one of the principal parts.

By reason of her indisposition the production was postponed.
