THE COOK'S CORNER

Ham Rolls
8 slices cooked ham
1 cup dry breadcrumbs
1/2 lb. mushrooms, sliced
1 green pepper, chopped
2 tablespoons butter or shortening
Salt, pepper
1 1/2 cups thin cream sauce
Sauté the chopped pepper and mushrooms in butter or shortening, then add breadcrumbs, a little of the salt and pepper (to taste). Mix thoroughly, then spread evenly on each slice of ham. Roll and hold in place with toothpicks.

Spanish Steak
2 lbs. lower round, chopped
1 well-beaten egg
1/2 cup milk
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
1 tablespoon minced onion
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 No. 2 can tomatoes, drained
1 cup grated cheese
6 strips bacon
Mix the steak with egg, milk, Worcestershire sauce, mustard, minced onion, salt, pepper then pack into a loaf pan.

NOVEL BEDSIDE READING-LAMP

When two persons occupy adjacent beds, one may wish to read while the other desires to go to sleep. If the reader persists in keeping the light on it is difficult for the person in the next bed to drop to sleep. This difficulty is overcome by a triangular lantern fixed to the wall between the two beds and having a metal door over each angular side. With this contrivance the reader can have the light on with the door open toward his or her bed, while the sleeper is shaded by the closed door, says Chamber's Journal. The openings behind the door are glazed with plain, frosted glass to give a soft, diffused light, and a switch below the lantern is within reach of the occupant of each bed. Made of brass with a bronze finish, the lantern is a handsome fitting. It has a height of 9-1/2 inches, with a width of 6 inches and a depth of 4 inches. A small hole in the front between the two doors, which is screened by red glass, shows whether the light is on or off.

Grandmother's Quilt Patterns

PURPLE IRIS

Cut out applique pieces and sew as indicated on small blocks. Either print or plain material may be used. Arrange applique blocks and add plique blocks as suggested on quilt diagram. Insert 3-inch binding to match applique between blocks and around quilt.

Allow for seams when cutting pattern.

Material Required: 1 1/2 yards material for applique blocks; 1 1/2 yards material for plain blocks; 1-3 yards lavender material; 2-3 yards green material; 1-6 yards yellow material; 4 1/2 yards 3-inch binding around quilt; and for insertion. Blocks finishes 9 inches square; 28 applique blocks; 28 plain blocks; 3-inch binding and insertion.

Dorothy Dix's Letter Box

"Peace At Any Price" Justifies White Lies Told to Husband With Arguing Complex. Is Youth of Today Going From Bad to Worse?

Dear Miss Dix—Is there any cure for an argumentative disposition? My husband is good and kind, but he has the arguing complex and contradicts everything every one says. He is always on the other side of every question no matter what it is, or if he ever thought of before or not. I find the only way to live in peace with him is to yes-yes him, and the only way to get the things I want is to pretend that I wouldn't have them at any price. If I want to go to a place, I have to pretend to want to stay at home. That makes him insist upon my going. If I get an expensive new hat, I have to register dissatisfaction and threaten to send it back to the shop. Whereupon he tells me how becoming it is and makes me keep it. This saves a lot of useless arguments and quarrelling, but it means sacrificing my personality and more or less living a life of lies. Am I doing right or wrong in thus playing up to my husband?

Answer: I think that in your case the end justifies the means, and that it is better for you to pretend to agree with your husband than it would be to be in a perpetual wrangle with him. "Peace at any price" should be the motto hung above the fireplace in every home.

And certainly there cannot be any peace in a household in which the husband and wife are continually arguing over everything from politics to pie and where no one dares to introduce a new topic of conversation for fear of starting something. I have in mind now such a home at which I occasionally visit and from which I always return feeling as if I had been through the Battle of the Marne.

Anything will start a fight because both the husband and the wife are disputatious by nature and dearly love an argument. Let one say even so simple a thing as it is reasonable weather for this time of the year and the other flatly contradicts the statement and says that nobody but a moron would make such an idiotic assertion when the meteorological statistics show that the temperature is above normal and the precipitation lower than usual, etc., etc. And the scrimmage is on. Voices get high and shrill and expletives and deprecations fly back and forth until murder is in the air and the children run frightened and weeping from the room.

And all about nothing. And that is what most arguments are about, nothing. Unless you are a witness in a homicide case what difference does it make whether you saw the butcher cross the street at 4:30 or 4:45? That does it matter whether you had mince pie or ice cream for dinner last Christmas. Yet things so trivial as these furnish the argument that cause husband and wives temporarily to hate each other and turn many a quiet evening into sound and fury.

And why should any one set himself or herself up as an authority on every subject and try to force those with whom they live to accept their opinions? Why not let every one enjoy their own taste in cooking and literature and religion in peace without arguing with them about it?

Of course, when men or women are arguers it is because they are possessed of colossal vanity and consider that the world is waiting with bated breath for their opinions. It is their way of turning the spotlight of intelligence to disagree with everybody on every topic.

There is no arguing with the arguers, no convincing them of how unfair and unjust and tiresome they are. To dispute what they say merely brings on more words and gives them a fresh start. The only way to shut them up is to make a surface agreement that cuts the ground out from under their feet. You can get into an acrimonious dispute over whether Bacon wrote Shakespeare or the New Deal or the Babe's batting score with one who merely smiles and says: "Really. How marvelous that you understand it all!"

You have been wise enough to perceive this and this enables you to live in peace and harmony with the arguer. If you call for a few white lies, believe me they are the sort on which the Recording Angel will drop a tear and blot them out. But, Lord, how I pity a woman who has a husband with the arguing habit.
