Canada Has Record Wheat Crop

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 11.—The bureau of statistics estimated the total wheat crop for the year as 444,282,000 bushels as compared with 409,811,000 bushels last year. Fall wheat is estimated at more than 22,000,000 bushels and spring wheat at more than 421,000,000.

Today's report notes that damage from hail and frost has been considerable in Manitoba and Saskatchewan. Out rust has been prevalent in the latter provinces. "For Canada as a whole the wheat crop is the second largest on record" states the report.

Want of Confidence Motion Defeated

CANBERRA, Australia, Nov. 11.—The motion of want of confidence in the Bruce government because of its decision to sell the Commonwealth line of steamships moved early in the week in the House of Representatives by Matthew Charlton, Labor leader,
