ALLIANCE TAKES DEFINITE ACTION

A Meeting Was Held Yesterday Morning and Results Were Attained.

A large meeting of the Executive of the Provincial Temperance Alliance was held in the Y.M.C.A. parlour yesterday morning. The president reported in reference to the Bill prohibiting importation, that it was in the hands of the Minister of Justice and the representatives in Parliament had been written to also the Temperance Departments of several Churches and it seemed probable that nothing would interfere with its introduction.

In reference to the exercise of the pardoning prerogative of the Lieutenant Governor, which has aroused considerable feeling the whole matter was thoroughly discussed and after consultation with His Honor an understanding was reached regarding future cases which was perfectly satisfactory to the Alliance.

NOT WORRYING OVER WIFE'S DISAPPEARANCE

LONDON, Dec 15—The mystery surrounding the disappearance of Lady Churchill, wife of Viscount Churchill, who was last seen with three children on St Pancras Railway station two weeks ago Sunday, has become deeper. Up to yesterday it had been generally understood that her husband was the author of a reward posted for information as to her whereabouts but last night this was denied by authority of Lord Churchill.

Today the Earl of Lonsdale, brother of Lady Churchill, circulated a telegram in which he said he was exceedingly surprised to read in the newspapers that neither Lord Churchill nor his solicitors had offered the reward of \$125 for information as to Lady Churchill's whereabouts. "For," says Lord Lonsdale, "it was put up in St Pancras station by solicitors and with Lord Churchill's consent."

COURT OF CHANCERY

SPLENDID MEETING OF ABEGWEIT A.A.A.

The Wearers of the Red and Black Congregate and have a Good Time

In response to an attractive invitation and a very cleverly designed souvenir program, a very large attendance of members of the Abegweit A. of the Charlottetown Business Col. A.A.A. gathered in the Assembly Hall last night. Dr Yeo, the president, occupied the chair. After reading of the minutes of the last general meeting, reports of committees, reception of new members had received attention, the consideration and adoption of the new constitution and bye-laws followed. The most important features were the changing of the club name to the Abegweit Amateur Athletic Association, and the adoption of a Board of Directors as the governing body of the Association. Quite a number of new members were added to the roll. The attendance was estimated to be about one hundred and twenty-five members.

MORGAN IS AFTER TELEPHONE LINES

TOLEDO, O., Dec 15—Announcement was made here today that J. P. Morgan and company are the purchasers of two of the independent telephone properties in which James S. Bradley, jr., of this city, recently secured control. Details of the deal with future operations are not made known officially.

Mr Bradley admitted today that he has perfected a deal for the independent plants of Columbus and Dayton, Ohio. Control of the six companies is said to represent a cash outlay of \$8,000,000. The deal announced today is said to be the first investment of financial interest of Morgan and company in independent telephone properties. The United States company is the long distance service of the Independence in Ohio and Michigan and the new long distance company of those in Indiana. The management will remain practically the same as now. It is stated that these properties will be continued as "separate plants in competition with the Bell, but upon conservative lines without disastrous price cutting."
