Observe Columbus Day

In observance of Columbus Day, Souris Council Knights of Columbus held their annual dinner meeting in their Council Chambers on Wednesday evening, October 22nd. The meeting was presided over by the Grand Knight of the Council Paul C. Gallant. Seated at the head table, in addition to the speakers of the evening, were District Deputy Andrew F. Peters and Past State Deputy J. Brenton St. John.

The guest speaker for the evening was Lt. Col. Leo F. MacDonald of Charlottetown, who chose for his topic "Columbianism as it applies to Canadianism." The speaker dealt with our new status as Canadian Citizens and warned against our drifting into the situation into which other nations of the past have drifted. The fall of a Nation, Mr. MacDonald pointed out, is comparatively simple and must come either from without or within or a combination of both. Canada is now a nation and we must ever be on our guard for inner decay. In a scathing denunciation of Communism the speaker warned that its danger to Canada is imminent. We must fear the Soviet, Mr. MacDonald said, and we must tell Russia that we don't
