The session, presided over by the president, J. J. Trainor, was held in the Charlottetown Sporting Club. Mr. Trainor and Mr. Daniel Coughlin, members of the delegation, gave the report.

The meeting also adopted a constitution and by-laws after reading and discussing each clause. It was provided that membership in the organization was open to all bona fide Queen's County workmen. Initiation fee was fixed at 50 cents, with dues of 25 cents each month for eight months of the year.

Those who wished to join between now and the next meeting were advised to communicate with Mr. Registrar Maher at Lyons Coal Company's office. Regular meetings of the Association would be held the first Thursday in each month. It was decided.

**Conditions In Orient Described By Missionary**

Miss Loretta Shaw of Saint John, N.B., missionary on furlough from the Women's Institute, attended joint meeting of the Women's Auxiliaries of St. Peter's and St. Paul's Churches yesterday afternoon. The meeting was held in St. Paul's parish hall.

Miss Shaw, who has spent a number of years in the Orient, gave a very interesting and informative address on conditions in the Far East, referring particularly to living and working conditions in Japan. She described the efforts of Christian workers in Japan and of the work native Christians were undertaking, making special mention of an orphanage under the control of a Japanese and his wife, which cared for 300 children.

Mrs. E. V. Bell, diocesan president of the Women's Auxiliaries, presided. Mrs. Harold Pickard, president of St. Peter's W.A. moved a vote of thanks to the speaker, which was seconded by Mrs. J. Pierce, president of Branch A of St. Paul's Church W.A.

**Feasibility Of Project Strongly Stressed By Mr. W. Chester S. McLure.**

An important contribution to the discussion on the Brighton Bridge project was made at the meeting held Monday night in Victoria by Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, who cited a report he had obtained from a Government engineer in 1933 as to the feasibility of the work. The engineer estimated the cost to be between \$400,000 and \$500,000 if it was necessary to put down four caissons, but his estimate had been made without proper soundings or borings, and the cost, the engineer stated, would be reduced by about 25 per cent if only two caissons were found to be necessary, as may be the case.

Mr. McLure suggested two methods of approach in obtaining the necessary information. The Dominion Government to make it wholly a federal project, on the ground that this part of the country is a railway transportation. He indicated the successful effort in obtaining the necessary information from Hunter River at no expense to the local Government. He could not see why this section of West River could not get something along this line.

If the Dominion Government would not take it on as a fully financed project, but on a fifty-fifty basis, the Dominion Government paying fifty per cent, the Provincial Government forty per cent, and the City perhaps ten per cent, Mr. McLure suggested.

He then referred to the three delegations that journeyed from Exeter to present the necessary papers the amounts that this province was going to receive next year, but he stated there were no figures on that point. The delegations yet, and that he would like to see a big meeting held in Charlottetown a little later on and that the necessary information be sent. He also noted that a lot of other projects were mentioned, but there was very little mention of a Brighton bridge project. The Labour Committee had proposed the Brighton Bridge project at Ottawa, but nothing definite had been heard from this delegation either. He stated that he would like to see a report immediately, and also assurance that the promised survey be started at once and that this work would be underway before the summer was over.

He stated that they had been successful in the past in receiving full consideration for the project, and that the money was all spent for labour. The Federal Government had also paid \$15,000 for construction of labor in rebuilding Falconwood Hospital, and \$48,705.61 for building 2 3-10 miles of concrete highway at Borden, a project which was done entirely at federal expense.

He went on to cite that \$106,000,000 has been recently voted for public works, and that the money is for unemployment relief. The Labor Committee had been assured at Ottawa that Prince Edward Island would receive its proportionate share of the \$40,000,000 appropriation, and that Prince Edward Island should see that it got its share.

Mr. McLure compared the cost of Hillsboro bridge to the present project, stating the approach work could be done much cheaper and flood means could be put away some of the flats to take care of the overflow, which he thought would be just as cheap as the clay pipe. Referring to the work of the crewwork and stone and clay, he said all this material could be taken from the immediate vicinity and the project would employ a lot of men, which was needed.

In closing, he stated that in 1902 a full report was made by the engineer to build Hillsboro bridge. He went on and cited that Hillsboro Bridge had been costing the people of Prince Edward Island a fortune since it was built, and flouting this up with interest, the amount would be very large, sufficient to cover the cost of the Brighton bridge work.
