—AT THE FRONT.—The following letter was received on Saturday from the trenches at the front.—March 22nd 1916, 1st Canadian Division, 3rd Brigade, B. E. France.—Dear friend, I have been lying here in my dug-out thinking of the folks at home, which reminds me that mother said in her last letter that she heard you sent me a parcel some time ago. I received a lovely cake which we all enjoyed, but there was no name attached to it. I wish to thank you kindly for it. I have been out here in this country for over seven months. There are not many of the boys left who came over here with me, they are dropping out one by one but I have escaped so far. We have had a pretty tough old winter but the last two weeks have been warm, delightful weather. I expect to go on pass to England in a couple of weeks and it will be a welcome change. I am with the bomb throwers and like the work well. I suppose you see lots of soldiers in Summerside. I was reading a Charlottetown paper where the 105th Battalion was to be equipped with rubber boots. If they reach France in the summer time they won't be able to carry much of a load around with them. My pack consists of a rubber sheet, a rain coat and an extra pair of socks. I am in good health and not down hearted. Well for want of news I shall have to close. Trusting that this letter will find you all well, I am your sincere friend. Ray Sullivan.—H.

Two brothers survive the deceased: Malcolm McDonald of Dundee and Alexander of Brooklyn. She was a woman of firm faith and died trusting in the merits of her Saviour. The funeral services were held at the home of Mr. McL on, on Saturday, the 9th, and interment was in Orwell Head Cemetery, beside the remains of her husband.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Ewen McInnall Minister of the Church of Scotland, assisted by Rev. Mr. McLeod of Caledonia. Six members of the 105th acted as pall-bearers and in behalf of the Battalion presented a wreath in token of respect and sympathy. Enshrouded in the uniform of his King and Country his body was laid to rest in Caledonia Cemetery, while the hearts of the bereaved find their comfort in that which is beyond all earthly achievement, the glorious victory of Divine love.

MR. JOHN McPHERSON, KINROSS.

Another of the old land marks of Kinross is gone in the person of John McPherson who passed away at his home on April the seventh. He was born near where he died on Feb. 29th, 1829 and had passed his 87th year, the last of a family of eight.

Mr. McPherson was married in 1857 to Mary McLeod who died 13 years ago. Four of the children born to this union have, also gone on before, Mary an infant, and Mary 9 years old, Donald 21 years and Margaret 33 years.

Three children survive the deceased Mrs. John Livingston of Brookfield, Malcolm at home where the father died, and Mrs. Kate McLeod who lives near by.

Mr. McPherson had a fall two years ago which confined him to the house. Two months before his death he kept his bed and failed rapidly. Mrs. McLeod his daughter and Malcolm and family were at his bed side when he passed away. He knew the end had come and had no fear. He was conscious and bright till the last.

Mr. McPherson always welcomed his pastor during his illness and assured him of his trust in the Saviour of mankind. The funeral services were held at the old home on April the 8th and the remains were laid away in the family plot in Orwell Head Cemetery, a short distance from where he had spent so many years.
