Mt. Allison to Hold Big Reunion on 19th

SACKVILLE, Jan. 13.—Mount Allison is planning a red letter day for Wednesday, January 19th in the shape of a general get-together of many prominent men of the Maritime provinces who have Allied themselves with the half-million dollar endowment and building fund campaign for the old college.

A number of prominent speakers have been secured for the occasion and an effort is being made to have Sir Arthur Currie present as the principal speaker of the day.

Beginning at 2 o'clock in the afternoon a series of meetings and conferences will carry the visitors through the balance of the day and evening but enabling those who find it impossible to remain overnight to return to their homes by the late trains.

This gathering in addition to furnishing the final send off for those more prominently identified with the endowment campaign for Mount Allison will bring together for the first time in many years a great number of former Mount Allison classmates.

Those who are expected to be present include the six zone chairmen and their assistants, practically all the group leaders, about forty in all, church chairmen numbering nearly two hundred and fifty and every Methodist minister in the three provinces. A committee has been appointed for the entertainment of the visitors and many old acquaintances will be renewed after years of separation.

CANADIAN NEWS TO OCEAN LINERS.—A new feature of Canadian shipping, namely the transmission of Canadian news bulletins by the C. P. O. S., to their Atlantic liners, via the Canadian Marconi Company is now stated to be working very satisfactorily. The Canadian Pacific Ocean Service are the pioneers of this service which has been in great demand by Canadian passengers. In an interview with the local Marconi Company the Star learned that detailed reports have just come to hand from aboard C. P. O. S. liners. The company states that the new service, which is a few weeks old, has been received out as far as 1,800 and 2,000 miles, practically within the first day of leaving port on the other side.

UNEMPLOYMENT IN HALIFAX.—That the unemployment situation of Halifax was one that should be dealt with immediately and efficiently was the unanimous opinion expressed by representatives of almost every commercial, social and charitable organization of the city at a meeting called at the personal request of Mayor Parker and held at the City Hall. That the Federal Government should be urged to carry on with the construction of the South end Terminals, at present in a very neglected state, thereby providing employment for hundreds of men, was the dominant proposal of the evening. There were now registered at the Employment Office about five hundred men and the opportunities for employment had been exhausted, were other facts brought out during the discussion. The general opinion seemed to be that such of the unemployment at Halifax at present was caused by the influx of people from the country, and Terrace Bay, according to last meeting must have been as populous at London by the numerous complaints made regarding the people of that district who had come to Halifax for the winter, and now found themselves destitute.

Favors Church Union in Canada

TORONTO, Jan. 13.—Believing that the rising national spirit in Canada and the urgent problems that demand united action call for the union of the various religious denominations, the Toronto General Ministerial Association today went on record in favor of church union in the Dominion. A resolution to this effect was passed as being in the nature of a reply to the appeal of the bishops at the Lambeth Conference for the establishing of a church genuinely Catholic, "gathering into its fellowship all who profess and call themselves Christians."

The resolution embodied the following reference to the action taken at the Lambeth Conference of bishops: "The association accept the four conditions stated by the bishops as assented to, the visible unity of the church, viz., the Holy Scriptures, the Nicene Creed, the two sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion, a ministry acknowledged by every part of the Church as possessing not only the inward call of the spirit, but also the commission of Christ and the authority of the whole body, and the association, moreover, believes that no serious difficulty need be experienced in the acceptance of a 'representative and constitutional episcopacy' subject to differences of interpretation as to its origin and significance."

Two Baptist ministers and one member of the Church of Christ declined to vote for the resolution. All the other members of the Ministerial Association voted for it.

CANADIAN POPPY SEEDS TO BE PLANTED IN BALMORAL GARDENS.—Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll, after whom Lake Louise, one of the most beautiful spots in the Canadian Rockies, was named, recently expressed a desire to have seeds from the poppies which have been planted in recent years in the gardens of the C. P. R. Hotel. These were sent to her at Christmas in a box made of Canadian Maple. Her Majesty the Queen heard of Louise's seeds through Miss Billington a delegate to the Imperial Press Conference, and on receiving a supply expressed her delight and gave instructions that they should be sent to be planted at Balmoral, Scotland.
