

# FEARS HELD FOR CREW

## Storm Takes Toll Of Shipping Off Newfoundland.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Oct. 3. — An unknown number of men were counted lost with an unidentified schooner tonight and four other ships lay wrecked along the Newfoundland Coast after the weekend hurricane of the south had whistled its destructive course past the island and on into the Arctic. Crews of the four stranded ships were safe, but there was no trace of the men aboard the schooner whose mast tips were sighted today off Lance Point, thrust up from below the surface of St. Mary's Bay. Apparently they had gone down with the ship when the gale blew over the Coast Tuesday night.

Though the sunken craft lay only a mile offshore, her slanted spars in plain sight from the beach, no bodies had come to land. Only a torn sail had drifted in on the white-crested rollers.

It was still too rough today to search for bodies, but boats were to leave Lance Point for the wreck as soon as the sea allowed.

The four other wrecked schooners were scattered along the coast. The "P.D." was aground at Catalina, a total loss. The Roberta Marie also was a total wreck at St. Mary's. The Marvella, coal-laden, was ashore at St. Mary's, and the "P.O." was on the rocks at Llewelly.

## U.S. PREPARES ARMS EMBARGO

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—A proclamation for clapping an embargo on munitions shipments to Italy and Ethiopia was drafted tentatively at the state department today. Only official confirmation that the undeclared war in East Africa was an "outbreak of war" within the meaning of the new Neutrality Act was awaited by Secretary Hull and his aides before recommending to present Roosevelt the issuance of the arms embargo directed by that statute.

Mr. Roosevelt, cruising on a warship in the Pacific, was kept fully informed of Italo-Ethiopian developments by Hull.

Beside the arms embargo, an official determination that "a state of war" exists also would authorize Mr. Roosevelt to issue a proclamation warning all United States citizens against travelling on vessels of either belligerent nations, except on his own risk. Issuance of that proclamation would affect American travel only on Italian liners, since Ethiopia has no Merchant Marine.

Hull, assisted by Joseph C. Green, chief of the office of arms and munitions control, was the author of the tentative embargo proclamation, violation of which would be punishable by a fine of \$10,000 and five years imprisonment.

**Steamer Adrift In North Atlantic**

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—The City of Hamburg reported by wireless to the Radio Marine Corp., station here today she is standing by the Norwegian steamship Askild, adrift in the North Atlantic.

The Askild, R.M.C. was informed, had lost her steering gear and was buffeted by a severe northwest gale. She had a woman and a child as passengers and carried a heavy cargo of lumber.

The Askild's location was listed as latitude 48.50 north, longitude 18.53 west. She left Sydney, Cape Breton, Sept. 28 for Swansea, Wales.

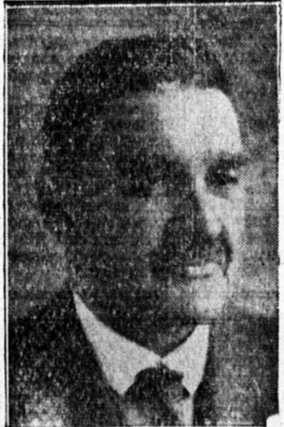
