14th February, 1918

Dear Lady Dimsdale:—

Anything that I can do to help the splendid officers and men of the Mercantile Marine, I would gladly undertake. The country will never be able to repay them for their heroism, and their chivalrous and patriotic efforts in carrying out their duties during this war.

Without their aid, the war could not have continued; they have fed the people of this country and our fleets and armies, facing death on every voyage, and leaving 10,000 of their shipmates at the bottom of the sea, who have given their lives for the State.

May all good luck attend you in your efforts on their behalf.
