**THE WAR SITUATION.**

Within the past week the war situation has been completely transformed so far as the western border is concerned, by the splendid advance of General French, the relief of Kimberly, the establishment of Field Marshal Roberts' headquarters at Jacobsdal and the forced retreat of General Cronje toward Bloemfontein. That so much could be so quickly accomplished without a general engagement and with so few casualties is one of the surprising features of this surprising campaign.

In other parts of the area of active operations there is not much to note. Owing to the weakening of our forces south of the Orange State border by the withdrawal of French's cavalry from Rensberg, and Kelly-Kenny's division from north-west of Stormberg, to strengthen Lord Roberts' advance, the enemy has been able to make a movement southward, regaining some of their lost ground in the Colesberg district. The destruction of a New South Wales Company is a most regrettable incident in this quarter.

Lord Roberts is now in a position to prosecute the invasion of the Orange State in strong force, and may be expected to speedily make the Free Staters very tired of the war. They have enjoyed their brief foray into Cape Colony, but will now realise the much more serious side of warfare when their own country is invaded. Lord Roberts' entire force is estimated at 50,000 men, and it would seem that he could not be successfully opposed in the open ground of the Free State without recalling a strong body from Joubert's forces on the Tugela and around Ladysmith, which must give relief in that quarter.

There are now about 2000 Chinamen in British Columbia who are naturalized British subjects. A bill has been introduced in Parliament to preclude from voting the Chinese and Japanese who may become naturalized. The bill will probably not pass. It might be quite proper to provide an educational qualification for voters, but no British subject ought to be excluded from voting merely on the ground of race or color.

The case of Roland B. Molyneux, now under sentence of death for murder, is remarkable in several ways. Molyneux is the son of a millionaire and therefore no pains were spared to secure an acquittal. The evidence was circumstantial. The man whom Molyneux sought to kill was Harry S. Cornish. To him was sent through the mail a package of bromo seltzer, in which had been placed a deadly poison. Cornish received the seltzer, which is a harmless medicinal preparation. Mrs. Adams, with whom Cornish boarded, having a headache, Cornish gave her some of the seltzer which quickly resulted in her death.

At first Cornish was suspected, but easily cleared himself. Molyneux was found guilty mainly on the testimony of experts in handwriting who swore that the address on the package of poison was written by him. Other circumstances indicated his strong enmity to Cornish. The jury quickly found Molyneux guilty, though the press and public had apparently expected a different result. He is sentenced to death by electrocution.

MODDER RIVER, Feb. 14.--General Lord Roberts, visited the camp of the Highlanders this morning and made a brief speech to each battalion. He recalled their assistance with him in India and declared that they had helped to make him what he is. He added that he never made a campaign without Highlanders and would not be without them. He was glad that General McDonald reported well of them. He referred to the arduous march of the Seaforth Highlanders had made with him and added that the brigade would have a shorter march now. Though it would not be a walk over, he did not have the slightest doubt of success. The brigade gave three cheers for the commander-in-chief and another three for Lady Roberts. In response to the cheering for the latter, Lord Roberts said that Lady Roberts was perhaps doing better work for them at home in helping the welfare of their wives and children.
