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SINGING DANCING
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FREE KICK GIVEN VISITORS TWO MINUTES BEFORE HALF TIME

FREDERICTON, Nov. 5.—The better of the argument in the University of New Brunswick won out. There was comparatively little open field running by the intercollegiate Rugby Football back divisions, but in that department Mount Allison 3-0, Mount Allison outplayed the this afternoon. The score was a U.N.B. penalty goal to nil. The free kick was given U.N.B. a minute or two before half time, because a Mount Allison forward failed to let a U.N.B. man get off the ball after it was held. Chestnut took the kick from a good position and put it over.

In the second period Mount Allison was given two free kicks in positions as favorable, but each kick went wide and the U. N. B. full-back touchdowned.

Hard Fought

The game was the closest and hardest fought seen here in many days. Mount Allison although displaying offensive power which could penetrate the Red and Black defended a strongly defensive team. Often the visitors got away on runs which looked good for tries, but the U. N. B. back division could cope with them. Late in the second half Goodspeed, the left wing for U. N. B. three-quarters, was collared by Stuart five yards off the Mount Allison line and lost the ball, which was recovered by Captain Bill Donohue, who in turn was stopped about six feet short of the line. That was about as near as the U. N. B. came to putting over a try.

Several times the Mount Allison forwards were as close to the U. N. B. line, but the Red and Black was able to work the ball out each time.

Weather Not Good

The game was played under weather conditions none too favorable. There had been a drizzle of rain although the footing was good. The teams were very evenly matched and play went from end to end, sometimes very rapidly, furnishing many thrills.

The game was largely a battle of the two forward lines. The two packs were evenly matched, Mount Allison's scrum having a shade of the edge in the first half while U. N. B.'s pack had somewhat the

edge. The play was so hard and rugged that there were frequent stops to make their passes while on the dash without slackening their speed and varied their attack. Bud Wilson, back of the scrum making long, daring passes to get the ball out to the wings. On reason the U. N. Get Away Faster

"I am tired and I want to rest." Ty said. "The game is getting harder each year and I am getting older. My legs are still good, my eyes are as good as ever, but I can't take chances any more. A ball player who can't take chances ought to quit. That's what I am doing."
