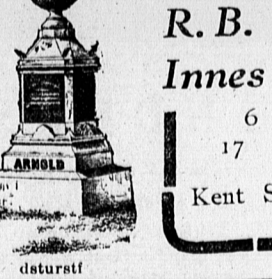

The body, accompanied by Mrs. MacLeod and Mrs. Robertson, was taken for interment in Valleyfield cemetery, P. E. Island, where Mr. MacLeod's first wife lies buried.—N. B. Es.

Rev. T. F. Fullerton takes charge of both services in St. James Church tomorrow. His texts for morning and evening are respectively: "Contact with God" and "Foreground and Background."

The travelling public throughout this Province should be greatly interested in the splendid descriptions of the hotels of the Canadian Pacific Railway which are given on page one of today's Guardian.

Yesterday's Guardian should have said that T. Nichol, City, Agent of the Plant, returned the previous day from Boston, where he spent the winter. He was accompanied by Mrs. Nichol and little son.

Miss Norah Longworth, Hillhurst, City, is the proud possessor of a beautiful Airedale Terrier. The animal arrived from Toronto yesterday and is a fine specimen of the breed and has a lengthy pedigree. His sire being Coine The Tyke winner of the cup at the Bench show recently held in Winnipeg.

The county court of Queen's County has been adjourned to meet again on Tuesday. At the last session on Wednesday judgment was given in the application for a non-suit in an action of Horne vs. Clow which was granted. A number of judgments will be delivered in deferred cases on Tuesday.

Many here will be interested in the prices at present prevailing in Halifax markets, which offer comparison with prices here. Beef, principally from Ontario, sells at 9 to 10 cents by the carcass. Mutton, cold storage, is sold wholesale at 9 to 10 cents per pound. Lamb, sells at 11-cents, wholesale. Veal is very scarce there and sells at from 7 to 8 cents a pound by the carcass. It is mostly all local veal but a small quantity is imported from this province. Pork is worth 8 to 9 cents wholesale, having declined two cents in as many weeks. Turkeys, only cold storage, are wholesaled at 24 to 25 cents per pound; chickens, 18 cents and geese and ducks, 16 cents.

Rev. W. H. Van Allen, Boston, who visited this province last summer, preached an interesting sermon in the Church of the Advent there recently. Some of his remarks follow: "No more incoherent nonsense could be uttered than was contained in the statement of that blatant idiot of a woman in New York who said that a woman could not dress properly under \$50,000 a year. It is a dreadful thing to give 2000 college freshmen of the year, I know of a Harvard student who received a yearly allowance of \$10,000 before he was of age and \$30,000 when he became of age. That this particular young man did not go to perdition is due to a miracle of divine grace." Dr. Van Allen also scored those girls who come from middle class families and work in department stores, not because of necessity, but for pin money. He declared that they reduced the standard of wages and were morally responsible for girls who went wrong because of insufficient wages.
