

# SAINT MALACHI'S

Church, Kinkora, Nearing Completion.

## GEM IN ARCHITECTURE

A Credit to the Diocese and to the Pastor, Rev. J. J. McDonald.

Standing on the high ground from which the old church was some time ago removed, and commanding a magnificent view of a surpassingly beautiful section of the Province, of which it is the landmark for many miles on all sides, is the new church of St. Malachi, Kinkora, which is saw rapidly approaching completion, and which will be opened for divine worship, with the imposing ceremonial provided for such occasions, on Sunday, July 21st next. It is certainly a gem among the Island churches, and it is a fit setting for its lovely surroundings. Such a structure is a credit to the diocese, to the zealous and popular pastor, Rev. John J. McDonald, and to the people of Kinkora, who are to be congratulated upon having such a fine place of worship which will, we understand be clear or just about clear of debt when opened. This grand result is due to the indefatigable efforts of Father John, and the practical unity, harmony and good will with which the parishioners seconded him in the undertaking.

The new church is cruciform in shape and twelfth century Gothic in style of architecture. It is 113 feet in length, 65 feet in width across the transept, and 45 feet across the nave, with a sacristy 33 x 20 feet on the western or Gospel side of the sanctuary. There is a basement under the whole building, with walls of Island sandstone. The exterior is very handsome indeed, the tower buttresses, clerestory, large traceried windows, in the transepts and over the main entrance, the Gothic porch and doors, in keeping with the style of architecture adopted, giving the edifice an imposing, massive and attractive appearance. The front has a large central entrance, with traceried windows above it, and on the left is a square tower with round buttresses carried to the height of twenty feet, surmounted with a large, light and a very graceful spire, and a Celtic cross finished in gilt. To the right of the main entrance is a shapely round tower, carried to a height of about thirty feet, the lower part of which will be used as a baptistry, above which will be a store room for books and other choir belongings. The transept gables are also handsomely finished with large traceried windows as noted above, and over the intersection is a beautiful campanile surmounted with a gilt cross. The sacristy and entrances are in keeping with the general plan of the structure. The whole exterior of the building is characterized by massiveness, grace and beauty that are exceedingly attractive and effective. The features that first strike one on entering are the spaciousness and brightness of the interior. The transept and choir windows, already referred to, and the sanctuary and clerestory windows give a flood of light which appears to be equally diffused throughout the building no part of which is in the least dark. (We are informed that there are no "Susquehottians" in Kinkora.) There will be centre and side aisles and the pews will be finished in hard woods, with a handsome finish of ornamental woods. The Chancel, which is large and beautifully finished and lighted, and which has a hard wood floor, is one of the finest we have seen anywhere. It is a seven-sided apex 28 x 23 feet, with shapely windows, which are intended to be of stained glass, with representations of the Crucifixion, the Immaculate Conception, the Sacred Heart, and other sacred themes. The sanctuary is lofty

in design and beautifully finished throughout, and over the high altar is a dove, a most artistic specimen of Mr. Anselme Vincent's carving. The altar rail is a fine piece of work in walnut, cypress and whitewood. In each wing of the chancel is a side altar, with very pretty carving, done by Mr. Clovis Arsenault, of Miscouche, and with arching which will admit of effective decoration. The transept is octagonal, with a high dome, and alternating traceried windows and panels, the latter of which will be finished with large oil paintings of sacred subjects. At each side of the nave is a row of very handsome cluster pillars, finished in birch, with curved white wood capitals. The roof is a groined canopy, finished in oiled birch, with ash trimmings and bosses at intersection of arches, and the effect is indeed most pleasing. The walls are finished with light tints. Immediately over the main entrance is a roomy and well arranged choir gallery, reached by a stairway in the tower. The interior of the sacristy is finished in the same style as the interior of the church, and it is most conveniently and neatly arranged, with dust-proof closets for vestments and altar equipment. There will also be an altar for Parochial Mass. The church will be heated throughout with steam, and will be very comfortable.

Altogether, St. Malachi's is a fine specimen of church architecture, and is a credit to all concerned. The architect was Mr. W. C. Harris, A. R. C. A., Charlottetown. The foundation and basement walls were constructed by Mr. Allan McDonald, Kinkora and the contractor for the superstructure was Mr. Francis Bradley, Kelly's Cross, with Mr. Clovis Arsenault, Miscouche, as foreman, and all have done their work well. Mr. D. Mackenzie of Tryon, was the painter and performed the work in an excellent manner. The finishing touches are being put on, and this week the grounds immediately surrounding the church are being graded by Mr. Peter Quigley, of Summerside. The grounds about the church and the parochial house, which is a hundred feet or so to the west and which is a handsome cottage, are really beautiful. There are hedges and windbreaks of spruce and hardwood, with ornamental and shade trees of maple and elm. In the rear of the church is the grave yard where the pioneers of Kinkora sleep their last long sleep, and adjoining it on the west is a large orchard. The view on all sides is especially fine, Kinkora and the adjoining districts forming one of the most thriving and attractive sections of the Province, and the country is now looking its best.

People will have a grand opportunity of visiting Kinkora, and of inspecting the new church on Thursday, 27th inst., when the first tea party of the new century takes place on the church grounds. The drive to Kinkora from any part of the country round about, is a charming one, and everybody who can at all do so, should visit St. Malachi's on the above date. It will be one of the most pleasant outings of the summer season, and all sure to enjoy it. Apart altogether from the attractions of the tea, the new church is well worth a visit and a day spent in seeing it will be well repaid.

# KINKORA VISITED

Description of Mr. Craig's Residence

## RECENTLY COMPLETED.

The Cheese Factory Visited in Company With a Prominent Resident.

The development of the farming sections of Prince Edward Island has attracted the interest of all Canada during the past few years. An exchange says: "The introduction of cheese and butter factories have in P. E. Island certainly made possible the conversion of a large quantity of raw material into a marketable product." On Friday last a GUARDIAN representative visited Emerald and while there was shown through the cheese factory which has gained such a Province-wide reputation for the quantity of cheese turned out. The factory is quite spacious in fact one of the largest in the Province. Mr. Wm. Clark the cheese maker finds it necessary to be assisted by four others in order to keep abreast of the supply of milk. The building is fitted with four presses and six vats. Last year 218 patrons supplied milk and it is expected when this season is at its best there will be fully as many. At the time of visitation hundreds of cheese were in the curing room of the factory which is kept scrupulously clean and in this particular as well as in all other regulations necessary, great praise is due to the cheese maker.

Just over the line—County Line—is the new and palatial residence of Mr. Albert Craig, who for a number of years has conducted an up-to-date general business in Emerald. The situation is a delightful one with a southern aspect having a rare elevation. The owner has evidently grasped the thought that there is "something glorious and appropriate in one's dwelling rearing its walls above all similar things." The lawn is ample and prettily arranged, the house setting back from thoroughfare avoiding "the usual swallowing of dust free of cost."

Standing on the lawn and looking to the south the observer's eyes rest upon a slope with a gradual incline, large fields dotted here and there by comfortable farm houses. The condition of the grasses and new born cereals gave the whole a velvety appearance. Paths and public thoroughfares wind naturally across the veldt, cows graze and the farmers were going too and fro amid the clouds of dust made by the machinery tilling the soil.

The Cape Traverse and the main line of the Prince Edward Island Railroad bound Mr. Craig's property in the rear. A carefully made plateau of 18 inches in height surrounds the house. On the south corner of the building is a spacious circular tower surmounted by a graceful dome. This tower affords valuable space not only to the first floor but also to the second floor as well. The total length of the building on the rear including the L is 55 feet. The front is what is known as "a bay front" with double verandah on the kitchen with entrance to the sitting room.

The foundation of the house is of Island stone specially prepared and in the cellar is a section divided by a stone wall in which the rain water accumulates from the spouts, and pumps connecting with the tank convey the water to the bath room and wash room. The cellar is frost proof and possesses all the qualifications of a first-class basement. There are two entrances to the main body of the house, the main entrance being finished with ash, the stair case being especially elaborate in design and finish, having two built newel posts.

Folding doors divide the sitting room from the hall. A tasteful arch divides off a vestibule, while another arch leads to other rooms. The floors of the hall and rooms on the first flat are of selected hardwood, well laid. The parlor is a spacious room, being 18 x 16. The other rooms are: dining room, 15 x 15; library, kitchen, pantry, wash-room. On the second flat there are five bed-rooms and a bath-room, besides closets.

The rooms not lighted by the regular windows are supplied with dormer windows. The lower sashes are fitted with one light, while the upper sashes are bordered with pretty glass.

The plastering evidences great care, the cornices etc., showing great care in detail. The work was done by Mr. W. D. Sherron of Crapaud.

The work of constructing the building was superintended by Mr. John E. Campbell of Cape Traverse. The furnace is the manufacture of Messrs. Knight & Black, Amherst. The laying off of the grounds was under the superintendence of Mr. Peter Quigley the renowned lawn artist of Summerside.
