FATUOUS HORN-TOOTING

There was a generous distribution of bouquets at the meeting of prohibition inspectors and sub-inspectors held Wednesday morning in Charlottetown.

On the same afternoon, on a road at the western outskirts of Summerside, the police had to be called to quell a disturbance among a prison gang, supposedly working under guard on the road.

Perhaps the prohibition officers, the Prohibition Commission chairman, and the Attorney General, who were so complacent about the enforcement of the law at their meeting Wednesday morning, can explain how the prisoners of Prince County Jail can secure booze and get intoxicated while undergoing punishment.

The time lost Wednesday morning in a fatuous exchange of compliments might have been better occupied in seriously enquiring into the extraordinary condition of affairs at Prince County Jail where a few weeks ago a prisoner on the morning of his transportation to Dorchester Penitentiary

was found to be in a drunken condition, and where, on the previous evening, arson had been committed right inside the jail. Or they might have considered how, in a prohibition Province, in a city the size of Charlottetown, it was possible for six men to be jailed in one night for drunkenness, and for three others to be confined to the asylum or the hospital suffering from delirium tremens.

Wednesday morning's petting party at Charlottetown, in view of what happened Wednesday afternoon at Summerside and what has been happening all week in this city, is worth noting. For it is significant of the whole administration of the present government, with its fixed belief in the credulity of the people and its utter incapacity to formulate or even to imagine a line of action uninspired by personal or petty political motives.

AN URGENT APPEAL

Armistice day, when it comes November 11th, will recall vividly the years of sacrifice during the war period when Canadians to the number of over half a million went forward in civilization's fight, entailing a human toll of over 50,000 dead and many more disabled.

And this is the game that is jokingly referred to as "an old man's game." This despite the fact that the majority of recent champions have been in their twenties.

Is the game really hard on you from a physical standpoint? Much depends on your make up. If you are of the leisurely type and do not take your golf seriously, don't rush from hole to hole, then the outdoors, the exercise and the mental enjoyment will make golf of great benefit to you.

If however you take golf very seriously, rush your work through to get to the links early, keep your mind and body tense as you try to remember all the suggestions given you by the club professional—the position of the feet, the grasp of the club, the position of the body, with all the other little details—then instead of being a benefit your golf may be doing you harm.

Don't misunderstand me, you have to learn golf as you had to learn to walk, to ride a bicycle, or a horse. It all meant concentration of mind and coordination of muscles. It all tired you until you learned to do these things automatically without thought on your part.

You cover a considerable distance and do a lot of work when you play a game of golf; the distance itself with some hills and the search for lost balls, all means effort.

My thought is that boys, girls, young men, young women, old men and women may all safely play golf if they will remember that there is considerable physical work in playing golf and govern themselves accordingly.

Middle aged and elderly folks who are just taking up golf, should play only a few holes at a time, as the mental strain of learning to play golf is just the same as in other games, and when the brain is used in an exercise, fatigue comes on sooner.

Tourists Scale Mount Alexander

(Special to The Guardian) NEW YORK, Aug. 22—Mount Alexander, which crowns above the Chadian Rockies 150 miles north of Jasper, Alta., was scaled for the first time by three Americans on July 31st, it was learned today.

The peak is about 11,000 feet above sea level, and it is known to the Indians as Kitchie. The ascent was made by Dr. A. J. Gilmour of the Yale Club, N. D. Watt, of Orange, N. J., and J. Euck, of 19 West Sixty Fourth street, none of whom have returned home.

Among others in the party that to make the wonder world of the western peaks known. It holds an annual camp when some notable climbing victories are made by both amateurs and professionals. As yet, however, only the fringe of this great Alpine field has been touched by the mountaineer.

CHAPTER 25

Colonel House in the meeting of the Allied Council, faced the difficult problem of forcing the Allies to accept Wilson's Fourteen Points on the basis of which Germany had asked for an Armistice.

Thomas Desbrisay, Junior, informs the public that he has opened an Apothecary's Shop in Charlottetown and intends to supply the medical wants of the inhabitants in general, where he offers for sale a variety of genuine drugs and medicines.

He is sorry that from various and unexpected disappointments his supplies have not been so extensive as he had expected and that for the present the sale of some articles is unavoidably limited to small quantities than he intended. However, as he intends to conduct his establishment in future on a more general plan he will take care regularly to be sufficiently provided with everything required in his line of business.

Families in the country remote from medical assistance may be supplied with medicines together with written directions as to their uses and applications.
