Hid Murdered Wife In Hay

NEWCASTLE, Pa. Feb. 26. - The body of Mrs. Sadie White, aged fifty-four, of this city missing since December 23 has been found buried beneath the hay in a mow in a barn which the woman's husband, Alfred Torrence White, who has been under arrest since Feb. 1, had rented as a garage and stable. The barn is half a mile from the White home.

When told of the discovery of the body, which was so badly decomposed that it was only recognizable by the clothing, White became nervous and refused to talk. The building had been locked up since White's arrest.

When news of the finding of the body spread, feeling ran so high against White, that heavily guarded he was placed in an automobile and rushed to the Allegheny county jail.

According to the story told by White when he was arrested on a charge of bigamy and another serious charge, after he had married Mrs. Mamie Longstreet, of this city in Pittsburg on the day before Mrs. White No 1 disappeared, the woman whose body was found had gone to Chicago to live after a separation.

ly to the League office to express his thanks and appreciation.

The Boys' Naval Brigade made very good progress during the past year considering our limited facilities in the early part of the summer. A number of the older boys are at present taking great interest in the work, and during the coming season it may be necessary to re-organize the Brigade under plans the boys are now working on themselves, in order to have the Brigade placed on a more efficient footing and to comply with Headquarters requirements. It is very essential that we should have a live sympathetic Committee to cooperate with the boys and to map out their work, so that the interest can be maintained in the winter as well as the summer months.

Last summer the Boys' Brigade had a very successful camp at West River under the charge of Petty Officer Clements, but it is felt, however, to be more important during the coming summer that our boys should be given an opportunity to have some practical experience afloat. It is therefore to be hoped that the financial assistance asked from the Dominion Government by the Headquarters of the Navy League of Canada for carrying on the work of the Boys' Brigade will be granted and that the necessary Training Ship will be furnished for the Maritime Provinces.

A satisfactory arrangement has been made so that the boys qualifying through the Naval Brigades can enter the service of the Canadian Merchant Marine, and through negotiations of this division with the management of the Canadian Merchant Marine, the summer arrangements were also made so that the boys desiring to enroll in that service before completing their training in the Naval Brigades can do so on very reasonable terms and conditions. If the grant asked for is voted at the next session of Parliament for the support of Boys' Naval Brigades, it is very likely that a brigade will be started at Summerside this year and possibly

From the information I was able to gather at the Dominion Navy League Meeting, it would seem that our Educational program should be developed or promoted along the lines adopted in Ontario and other provinces, and that is to make a decided effort to introduce into all the schools of the Province - in co-operation with the Department of Education - the history of Sea Power through the medium of the book "Flag and Fleet," and in order to create interest, and enthusiasm, the "Prize Essay" Competition as provided for by the Dominion Educational Council should be taken advantage of in Prince Edward Island as it is open to all the provinces of the Dominion.

The Campaign for funds carried on here, under the Chairmanship of Mr. S. A. McLeod, last October, in conjunction with the Dominion wide appeal, was considered fairly successful in Charlottetown the gross collections in Charlottetown amounting to approximately Fifteen hundred dollars. The campaign was hardly under way, however, in the country districts before it was learned that two other important appeals were being made for funds, one for the Prince Edward Island Hospital and the other for the British Red Cross Society in aid of the starving children in Europe. It was decided, therefore, to defer the Navy League Campaign outside of Charlottetown, for sometime in the winter, or until conditions were more opportune.

For the assistance of the various organizations, who so kindly co-operated in Charlottetown, the Executive are deeply grateful, and in connection with the Publicity Campaign carried on in King's County, the Navy League acknowledge their indebtedness and high appreciation for the splendid lectures and services rendered by the late Major A. A. Bartlett, who took such a deep interest in Navy League affairs.

In reviewing the past year's work I am sure the Executive of the Prince Edward Island Division, as well as all members, familiar with Navy League aims and objects, must feel highly pleased with what has been accomplished. We have laid a solid foundation, and all that we require is a good live Executive organization, with co-operation from our members and citizens generally, to make the Navy League in Prince Edward Island a most useful Public Institution.

In this regard the Publicity Committee can render a very excellent service if our people thoroughly understand the valuable work the Navy League is striving to carry out, there is no question but we could easily have a membership of 5000 or more in this Province, with the very small fee of \$2.00 an annum which includes the Sailor Magazine, issued monthly.

FOR EIGHT PASSENGER AIR-CRAFT FRENCH AERO GRANT PRIZE OPENS

PARIS, Feb. 26. - The grand prix of the Aero club of France, open to planes capable of carrying eight passengers, opened last night with the departure of "The Goliath" piloted by Ferdinand D'Or and Jean Benard from an airfield at Bourgen.

The huge plane started in the moonlight at about 10.30 o'clock on a 2,245 kilometer, nearly 1400 miles, flight and at first everything went well. Before reaching Lille, however, the aviators ran into a fog and lost their bearings. They returned to Bourgen but will make another start this evening in their attempt to win the prize of 100,000 francs. The Goliath is the only entrant at present. Other flights for the prize may be made in either May or June on the 20, 21, or 22 of either month. The flight takes in Paris, Pau and Metz. Meanwhile a discussion is going on here as to who was the first to fly in an airplane, without wings. The debate was started by a despatch from Spain that successful experiments were being made with an airplane that rises directly into the air without a preliminary run on a mossy mountain. Two French on a mossy mountain in the Cantons Ouedine, claim to have risen 8 for Canadian Ships to carry our Products over the seas.
