**ARRESTED IN CHARLOTTE TOWN.**—The St. John's Standard of January 19th says, "Word was received from Chatham yesterday that the chief of police in that town had placed under arrest Nicholas Richardson, who they located in Charlottetown, on the charge of bigamy; and the prisoner is being held awaiting the arrival of an officer from St. John's, who is expected here back to this city for trial. As nearly as can be learned, Richardson is a fairly well to do farmer who had resided at Notre-Dame de la Riviere de Portage. It was on March 26th, 1912 that he was married to Marie Jeanne Savoye, and the ceremony was performed by Rev. Theophile Haché, of Tracadie. Richardson resided with his wife for some time until he took a liking for Miss Fanny Veniot of his home place, and coming to St. John was married to her, giving his name as Nicholas Richardson. This second marriage was performed on August 16th last. The news of Richardson's crime soon became known and Rev. J. S. Robichaud, of Portage River, N. B., who is the priest in charge of that parish, took a hand in the matter and was instrumental in having a warrant sworn out for the man's arrest. Early last fall an officer was sent from St. John for the purpose of making the arrest but when he arrived at Richardson's home he found that the man had made his escape. Richardson turned up again a few days ago and the information being given to the Chatham chief of police he was taken into custody.

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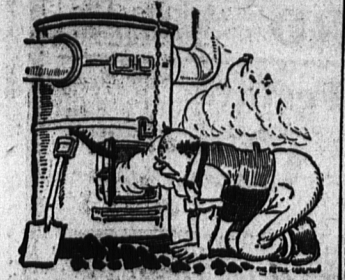

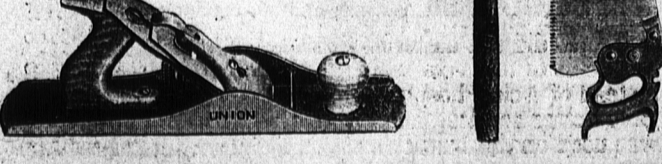
