## Laurier Welcomed to Jersey Islands

**He Meets a Most Enthusiastic Reception—A Paris Journal Denounces Him as a Renegade, More English than Pitt and More Imperialistic than Chamberlain.**

**LONDON, August 15.**—Sir Wilfrid Laurier's visit to the Island of Jersey was marked by an enthusiastic welcome from the people and the municipality and by a vicious attack upon the premier by a Paris newspaper. Before the welcome was read to Sir Wilfrid he was asked what language he desired to be addressed in. He replied that he wished to be welcomed in French, and the address was read in French accordingly. A more enthusiastic reception could not have been tendered the distinguished visitor.

The Patrie, of Paris, referring to Sir Wilfrid's visit to Jersey indulges in some scathing comments. Sir Wilfrid is described as a renegade. "He is more English than Pitt," continues the Patrie. "More imperialistic than Chamberlain." "He owes his success to the clever way in which he panders to the British vanity by vaunt-

ing his French origin, while loudly proclaiming himself a Britain and imperialist." Furthermore the Patrie charges that Sir Wilfrid has innocently the vagaries of pan-Britannism in old historic Canada and has desecrated the memories on Quebec and Montreal with anti-patriotic doctrines.

Comments of the Parisian newspaper on the result of the colonial conference are by no means pessimistic. Liberty regards the conference as a defeat for Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, who will, however, live to see imperial customs under his heart's dream accomplished.

The Journal Du Bas regards the result of the conference as of great importance, "Britain's dream of imperial federation," the paper goes on to say, "becomes more tangible than was hitherto considered practicable. Political federation may be accomplished at no distant date."

## "BACHELORS ARE MORAL DEGENERATES"

**Says the Chancellor of Nebraska University—a Plea for the Old Fashioned Marriage—The Tendency to Celibacy Needs to be Checked.**

**CATAGO, August 15.**—"Bachelors are moral degenerates. From them emanate most of the sin and shame of the world. They are lacking in mental and physical poise. The life of no individual is complete unless he or she have a life companion of the opposite sex."

Here in a nutshell, is the condemnation pronounced upon the unmarried individual by Dr. E. Benjamin Andrews, chancellor of the university of Nebraska, in a lecture before students and friends of the university of Chicago yesterday.

"Providence intended that men and women should marry," continued the speaker. "The world was made for the family and not for the individual. The unmarried individual of marriageable age has no place in society or in the scheme of the universe. Individuals who do not form legal ties with the opposite sex will

form illegal ones. The world does not want that kind of ties. Marriage is a good thing. The great men and women of the world—the ones whose lives were symmetrical and whose works were best for posterity—have been married."

Dr. Andrews found fault with the tendency of the age—the tendency of the bachelor man to use his worldly gain for his own selfish enjoyment, and the tendency of the bachelor girl to break away from family ties and hustle for herself. He advocated getting back to the good old fashioned ways of the pioneers, when men shaped their lives and their affairs primarily for the marriage state, and the girls, demure and hopeful, waited for them to come along to their fathers' house and propose. A return to that idyllic method, he thought, would give the individual the nice mental and physical balance the Creator intended he should have.

### WEDDING IN COBURG.

**COBURG, Aug. 15.**—The engagement is announced for the marriage of Miss Vivian Sartaris, grand daughter of the late President U. S. Grant, to Frederick Roosevelt Serrel, who is a cousin of President Roosevelt. The wedding will take place on Saturday, August 23, here, where Mrs. M. E. Grant resides.

**KINGSTON, August 14.**—Rev. J. W. Muirhead, a well known Presbyterian minister, died here to-day, aged 33.
