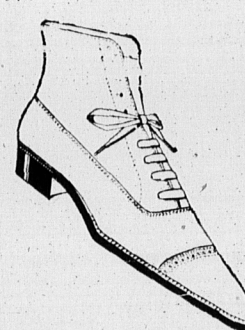

Loan To China By Dominion Concern

LONDON, Sept. 26.—The Times prints a Peking despatch today stating that a Canadian banking syndicate is lending China three million gold dollars against one year's bonds secured on surpluses, discount, and interest, giving a return of over 20 per cent per annum. It is recalled that an international consortium was formed to prevent loans to China under which there was no provision for supervision of expenditure to protect China against the present chaotic state of administration. The four governments agreed to give exclusive support to their respective banking groups with this agreement. The Times says the Canadian bank transaction is a direct negation of the British Government's policy in China. If the loan goes through, France, Japan and the United States will think the British Government subscribes to one policy with the right hand and another with the left hand, and the consortium will end. From reliable information obtained it is understood that only one Canadian bank was interested in the loan and the contract was made with China by a financial corporation in Vancouver. The position is that the British made an arrangement with other powers not to give approval to any of Chinese loans except through the medium of the consortium in order to prevent China from borrowing imprudently abroad, and also to limit extravagant expenditure. It is not understood that the consortium brings any political pressure on China to recognize the consortium or to interfere with private enterprises.

—Athens: September 26.—The ultimate fate of General Wrangel's Russian army in exile, of whom 20,000 officers and men still are camped on the Gallipoli Peninsula, still continues one of the unsolved puzzles of the Near East.

General Wrangel has held together the best of his officers and men from among the refugee army which fled from Russia before the victorious Bolsheviks. He has hoped that his forces would be again needed in Russia to maintain a new government "when the Soviet regime collapsed." But this is a hope deferred, and Wrangel's best fighting men wait in their tents and huts on Gallipoli.

Major Jean de Roover, chairman of the League of Nations commission for the exchange of populations between Greece and Bulgaria, has visited the Russian camp and brought away a very favorable impression of the officers and men. He knows something about the Russian fighting man, for he was formerly the Belgian representative with Wrangel's army when it was the bulwark of the anti-Bolshevik strength in the Crimea. He says: "In this camp, besides 1,500 women and children, there are 8,000 men and children, 10,000 soldiers and 2,000 cadets in the military schools. These troops have kept their mili-
