A delegation consisting of the Mayor, Major Fullerton and Canon Simpson of the Soldiers' Reception Committee and a detachment from No. 12 Construction Corps were on hand with autos to meet these soldiers, but it appears they eluded the reception party and got away with their friends in the crowd.

BABY SENT TO WRONG HOME FOUND DYING

NEW YORK.—Isacore Wisotski, a mechanical instrument worker, has asked for an investigation by the coroner of the circumstances in which his 2-year-old son was returned by the social services department of the Lebanon Hospital from a convalescent home at Sea Cliff, L. I., to the home of an Italian family, where the child was found to be dying. It was admitted by the hospital authorities tonight that two children had been confused, and a Jewish boy sent to the home of an Italian family, while the Italian boy was sent to the Jewish home.

Mrs. Wisotski and a nurse went to an apartment in Sixty-third Street where the Wisotski boy had been delivered. The door was locked and they asked the neighbors if the family occupying the apartment had recently received a child, and were told that a boy had been crying continually in the flat for several days past. The mother listened at the door, and exclaimed: "I heard my baby. I know his cry."

The janitor was summoned and opened the door. They found a baby lying on a piece of sheet iron which had been placed on two planks to raise it above the floor. A ragged blanket covered part of the sheet iron, but the child's head rested on the metal. The baby was wasted to a skeleton and had hardly strength to cry.

Neighbors said that the woman who had received the boy worked during the daytime and fed the child in the morning and evening, but left it at home during the day. The mother and nurse hurried with the child again to Lebanon Hospital. The following day the baby died.

SLIGHT HALT IN HIGH PRICE TREND

OTTAWA—A slight halt in the upward trend of food prices is recorded by the labor department as, having taken place in July. The department's number of wholesale prices for the month was practically unchanged from that for June, and the weekly budget of food retail prices at the middle of the month was lower at \$11.62 as compared with \$11.89 for June. Retail prices for potatoes were lower, but there were also decreases in eggs, butter, cheese, bread and flour, till the eggs later began to rise. Coal averaged slightly lower, but wood was upwards. Some advances in rents also occurred.

TO PREVENT USE OF CANNED VEGETABLES

OTTAWA—It is understood that the food controller has determined to prevent the public from using canned vegetables, while fresh vegetables are on the market and that an order to enforce this will be made by the government. This is in line with the advice given the public by the food controller that vegetables and fruits in season should be used and an effort made to dispose of all perishable foods before returning to canned and cured foods.
