There were fully one hundred and fifty passengers to Orwell yesterday afternoon by the S. S. City of London one half of whom were excursionists who returned at 8 o'clock in the evening. The return cargo consisted of 85 cases eggs, two beef cattle and sundry other consignments.

C. No particulars were given and no previous word had been received of his illness. Donald went to B. C. about a year ago and has been engaged on a planer in a lumber mill. He is one of the South African veterans.

A DARING RESCUE was made near the Ferry wharf yesterday afternoon by Joseph Praught, of the P. E. I. R. freight department. A sheep owned by Ebenezer Whately which was being marked in the car made its escape and after running around for some time, ran into the water at the foot of Prince Street and swam out some distance between the wharves. There was no boat at hand to rescue the sheep but after some time one was procured by Mr. Praught at railway wharf and with the aid of a board the animal was with some difficulty reached and brought back again to terra firma in an exhausted condition but no more the worse of its experience.

ONE world's record was broken, two Olympic records were lowered and one Olympic record was equalled as a result of the first day's events in the Louisiana Purchase Exposition revival of the Olympic games. There were also four handicaps that resulted in more even competition and gave very close finishes. A though the earlier part of the day Monday was threatening, when the games began there was nothing to be desired from a weather standpoint. There were about four thousand spectators present when the opening event was run. The first Olympic record to go was broken by John F. A. again of the Greater New York Irish Athletic Association in the hammer throwing competition, beating the record made by himself in Paris by 9 inches. The standing broad jump brought out a field which has never been equalled in the history of American athletics. The first jump, that of O. M. King of McKiney, of Texas, exceeded the record by 25 of an inch. Every demonstrator his championship form had not deserted him and established a record of 11 ft. 4 1/2 inches. The following were the winners in the running broad jump, handicap event in which Halpenny was entered but presumably did not compete as he was waiting for the pole vault later in the week - Fred Englehardt, M. A. C. N. Y. city (10 inches); Ist. 21 ft. 6 1/2 inches; G. E. VanCleave, Olney, Ill. (16 inches); 2nd, 21 ft. 6 1/2 inches; J. P. Hagerman, Pasadena, Cal.; 3rd, 21 ft. 6 1/2 inches. Distances are actual jumps.
