THE CATTLE EMBARGO.

It is now ten years since the embargo was placed upon Canadian cattle in the markets of Great Britain. Since that date all cattle from this country have had to be slaughtered immediately on landing in the Mother Country. Previous to 1892 almost all Canadian cattle exported to Great Britain were sold to Scotch feeders who further fattened and finished them for the market. By "scheduling" our cattle this trade was wholly cut off, greatly to the loss of Canadian stock-growers, and quite as much to their dissatisfaction because of the sheer dishonesty of the pretext on which the embargo was originally based and has since been maintained. That pretext was that pleuro-pneumonia existed in Canada. It has been amply demonstrated that the disease has no existence in this country and has not had for many years past if indeed it ever had. It has further been shown that pleuro-pneumonia exists if Ireland and has from time to time prevailed there to some extent while Canada has been free of it, and yet cattle are still imported alive from Ireland into England and Scotland without any of the restrictions imposed upon Canadian cattle.

These facts go to show that the embargo maintained by the British Board of Agriculture is at once arbitrary, unfair and based upon a reason wholly separate and apart from the reason assigned. The assigned reason is the danger of British herds becoming infected with pleuro-pneumonia from Canadian cattle. The real reason is that British stock-raisers want to shut out the competition of Canadian cattle. British free-trade ideas prevent the adoption of protective duties, but the same end is obtained by the hypocritical device of pretending to take precautions against the danger of infection where no such danger exists. This is the more exasperating because Canada has during the same period given to British goods and products a preference to the extent of one third of the customs duties.

Again and again remonstrances have been made by the Canadian Government, and by our successive High Commissioners. Again and again it has been shown that there is no pleuro-pneumonia among Canadian cattle. The British inspectors have failed to find it among the thousands of Canadian cattle which are slaughtered

immediately on their arrival in England. Scottish feeders have joined with Canadian shippers in this remonstrance. British consumers also earnestly desire the removal of the embargo that they may have the benefit of competition which real free trade in cattle would give them. But all these remonstrances have been so far in vain. The only result has been in each case the usual ministerial promise that the matter would be considered. There is no immediate or early prospect of a change. Apparently nothing short of a thoroughly aroused Canadian feeling on the subject, coupled with a determination to assert and protect our rights, will induce the British Government to treat us fairly in this matter by abandoning the baseless and hypocritical embargo.

TARIFF REFORM IN THE STATES.

There is a lesson for Canada in what is going on in the United States. The Democratic party, ill-led, and much divided in sentiment during a number of years past, has within the past year devoted itself with increasing unanimity to the policy of tariff reduction and reform. The result of this has been that in the elections which have just taken place they appear to have substantially increased their representation in Congress and made gains in strength in numbers all over the union. This fact will give new heart and hope to the friends of tariff reform who will redouble their efforts to capture the country two years hence when the Presidential election comes round.

During the campaign just now ended there were many evidences that the Republican leaders recognised in the high tariff and the trusts which are its legitimate offspring the greatest danger of a party overthrow. They dropped all pretext of despising the agitation for tariff reform. They were put upon the defensive. They claimed that trusts might exist independent of the tariff, and that there were good trusts as well as bad ones. But the truth is dawning upon the great mass of consumers. They see how a high tariff always lessens competition. That is its admitted object, to cut off competition from without. Protectionists have all along contended that domestic competition is sufficient. But under shelter of the tariff the manufacturers have combined in trusts and mergers to entirely kill off domestic competition. The people, the great consuming class, out of whose pockets millions have been extorted by the high tariff and the trusts, are growing more and more urgent for tariff reform.

And the voice of the people will be heard and heeded.

Either the now dominant Republican party must meet the demand by large and liberal concessions, by tariff reduction, or by reciprocity treaties, or both, as the late President McKinley recommended, or they will be swept from power in the not distant future. And, as we have said, there is a lesson in this movement for Canada. That lesson is not to yield for a moment to the clamor of the Manufacturers' Association and their new ally Mr. Tarte, but to guard the interests of consumers, checkmate the trusts and combines, and keep open the door of free competition. No Province of Canada has a deeper concern in this matter than has Prince Edward Island, whose interests lie in the direction of keeping trade as free as possible from tariff restrictions. And our people should regard with a very jealous eye a present proposal which looks very like the extension to our shores of one of the worst and most oppressive monopolies which has fastened upon the United States, to wit, the meat trust.

So far as popular opinion has found expression at public meetings throughout the country it has been almost unanimously hostile to guaranteeing the Dominion Packing Company's bonds as proposed by the Government. The Board of Trade

meeting and the resolutions of the Cheese Board have had their echoes from Long Creek, Marshfield, Belle River, Mayfield and other localities, all against the guarantee. It is evident that the people do not want the guarantee given. It is evident that they will not permit it to be given if in their power to prevent. There are two by-elections due to come off before the Legislature meets. The question arises, will the Government abandon their most unpopular proposal or court defeat in the by-elections by adhering to it? This is a question that must be met and answered in the near future. Every true friend of the Government must advise them that they have made a mistake and ought to take the earliest opportunity to clear themselves of the guarantee entanglement.

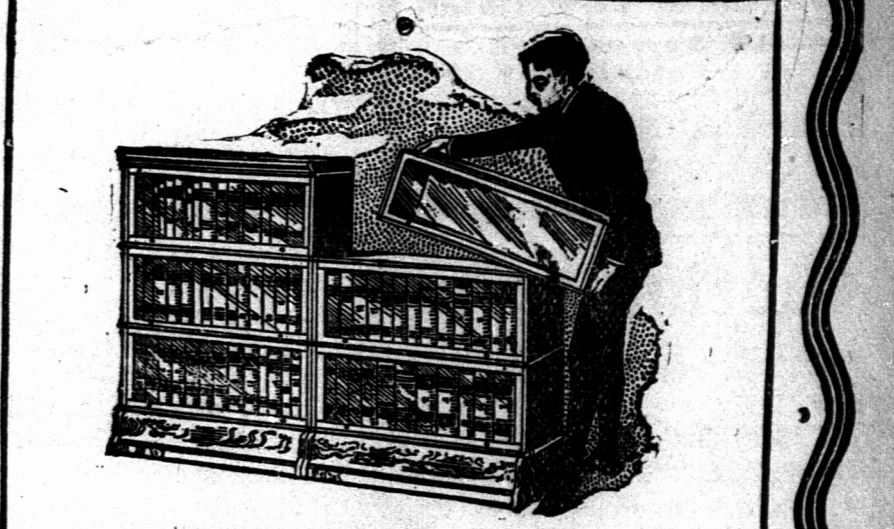
