Whether that is so or not, the combination of the reconstruction efforts of the victors and invaders and the forces of nature in the springtime have made of it once more a pleasantly smiling country that taxes the imagination to draw a picture of war in progress.

ISLAND BOY NOW A DISPATCH RIDER. The following letter was written in France by one of the youngest soldiers at the front, Harold Sellar, aged seventeen, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Sellar, formerly of the Morell House, Charlottetown and will be read with interest by his many friends:— May 14th, 1915. Dear Mother and Father:— Received your letter all right but this is my first opportunity to write for a long time. You will be glad to hear that neither Brother Ray or myself, had even a scratch during the big battle. There will be a great number of Canadian homes in deep sorrow after they receive the casualty list of the Canadian Division. I have not seen him yet, but the next time I go around the battalions I'll hunt him up, also some of the 2nd Contingent have arrived here. Well I may say we need all the officers and men here at present, to fill up the gaps I really believe if the boys at home could even practice in their minds a battle like we went through from April 22nd to April 30th there could not be one who would hesitate about enlisting. It was one of the worst in the history of the war, but the Canadians upheld their name. No man who was in that fight ever expected to get through alive, and those of us who are left must thank God for guiding us out. I lost everything including my equipments. When the battle began my kit was in an old house near the firing line, we were all called to stand by, and in the mean time a shell hit the house and everything went up in the blaze. I must get you to send me some socks and handkerchiefs. I do not need any underwear, as I can go without it in this weather. I saw Capt. A. R. B. Duck yesterday.
