Notice To Oyster Fishermen and Shippers

The oyster fishing season will open on October 1st. No one shall fish for, retain or kill any round oyster of a less size than three and one-half inches in diameter, or any long oyster of a less size than four inches in length, of the outer shell. On the end of every barrel in which oysters in the shell are being marketed, shall be clearly stencilled by the original packer, or the first dealer who repacks the oysters.

(a) His full name and address.
 (b) The minimum size of oysters in the barrel.
 (c) The name of the Province, and of the area within the Province from which the oysters are taken.

"I don't know," said I. "Print the story, of course."

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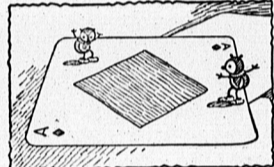

Netherlands A Market For British Columbia Apples

Canadian fresh apples have not gained a real foothold in the Netherlands East Indies, largely because quotations have always been received after local importers have closed contracts with United States sources of supply, writes Mr. B. C. Butler, Assistant Trade Commissioner in Batavia, in the forthcoming issue of the Commercial Intelligence Journal. Small annual shipments have been made with some success, despite the fact that they have usually been drawn from stocks that were in storage for several months. The importers have been convinced, however, that the Canadian apple, if given a fair chance, will sell as readily and enjoy as much favor as those from any other country. The fact that few importers will buy Canadian apples for their own account when Australian and United States stocks are often available on consignment is not the least of the difficulties to be overcome in developing a market for the Canadian product. Total imports into the Netherlands East Indies in 1930 were valued at approximately \$151,200 as compared with \$148,400 in 1929. Of this total over 80 per cent. was imported into Java. Imports for the first six months of this year into Java alone totalled
