THE CALL FOR AMNESTY.

The first demand of the Russian Parliament is for amnesty, the pardon and release of all persons under arrest, in prison, or in banishment for political, military, or agrarian offences. We can hardly realize the extent or importance of this demand. Russian prisons are full and Siberia's mines and prison colonies are full of men and women, who on bare suspicion, or with or without the semblance of fair trial have been deprived of their liberty on charge of conspiracy or offence against the Government, or the landlords, or some official clothed with authority.

These number hundreds of thousands, and the demand is that they be unconditionally pardoned and set free. The demand is made by the Russian Parliament, representing the entire Russian people. Political offences are too numerous and varied in Russia to be here described. They embrace every sort of offence that the imagination stimulated by malice or terror can conceive. Agrarian offences so-called are simply the attempts from time to time made to seize or destroy the property of the great land-owners other than peasants, on the theory that the land belongs to the peasants alone.

Amnesty is also asked for all military offences. These also cover a wide range, from simple insubordination up to such acts of mutiny and murder as were enacted at Sebastopol and Cronstadt when ships of the navy were seized, the officers slain or imprisoned, and the ship's guns turned upon other ships or the shore defences. Moreover the amnesty demanded for agrarian offences means a full recognition of the right of the peasants to own the land they occupy and till, which is more clearly set forth in another demand for the expropriation of the landlords' possessions, that they may be divided up among the peasant occupiers.

Very sweeping, it will be seen, is this demand for amnesty. But it is spoken with the voice of an earthquake. It is the voice of an hundred and fifty millions of people gathered into one.—"Long, loud, deep, piercing, dolorous, immense."

And it must be heeded. Well may the Czar and the grand ducal magnates tremble as they hear it. They have fattened long upon the sweat and toil of the masses at whose rights they have scoffed, whose lives and liberties they have regarded as little as if the masses were beasts of the field. We must read into the demand for amnesty all that the Russian masses have suffered of hunger and inconceivable oppression, if we would measure the gravity of the crisis.

Slowly comes a hungry people, as a lion creeping nigher.

A STRANGE ACT OF FANATICISM

HOMERAY, May 15.—A strange act of fanaticism causing the loss of several lives has occurred at Nasad, near Iere. A Sadhu, who claimed to be the divinity piled wood at the bottom of a deep pit, and having set it ablaze, invited believers to descend with him into the flames. He promised them immunity from harm, and that they would have the happiness to obtain a glimpse of heaven. The Sadhu and nine disciples—five of whom were women—then descended the pit, but had no sooner reached the bottom than they shouted for help. A hurried attempt was made to raise them by ropes, but the ropes broke, and the fanatics fell back into the flames. Three were rescued but have since died.
