Late Spring Chicks Mean Egg Scarcity

Poultry Expert gives warning of low production next winter CARE NEEDED NOW

"The delayed spring this year was responsible for many poor hatches and a large proportion of late Spring Chicks, this will mean far fewer pullets than usual" says Prof. F. Elford of the Poultry Division of the Experimental Farm at Ottawa. A serious situation has thus developed, according to Canada's chief poultry authority. At the present there are practically no eggs in cold storage. Usually eggs are coming forward in heavy shipments at this season and the storage houses become well filled. This year their floors are practically bare and supplies in sight are more limited than they have been for some considerable time.

Canadians are to-day consuming more eggs per capita than ever before, and so, with this combination of circumstances, the late-hatched chicks this year present a serious problem.

If ever there was a need for taking care of the pullets and bringing them to maturity at the earliest date, it is right now. In fact Prof. Elford goes so far as to advise securing expert advice and assistance in order that the maximum of eggs may be secured. Under the circumstances the poultry-keeper and the man or woman who has a few chickens in the backyard should do everything possible to take advantage of these conditions, and secure such information and knowledge as will enable them to get the best results

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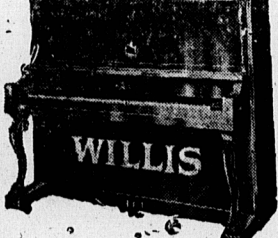

Canadian Route To U. S. Advocated

LONDON, June 29.—Sir Guy Gaunt, Conservative member for Buckrose, division of Yorkshire, asked in the House of Commons today whether the Government in seeking to encourage British steamship lines in the use of routes via Halifax which he claimed would do away with the present difficulties affecting immigrants to the United States and the inconvenience caused by application by the United States domestic legislation to other nationalities.

Sir Lamington Worthing-Evans, Postmaster General, replied that the mail service contracts called for a direct New York route. The Halifax route, he said, caused extra handling and delay and he was not prepared to make a change.
