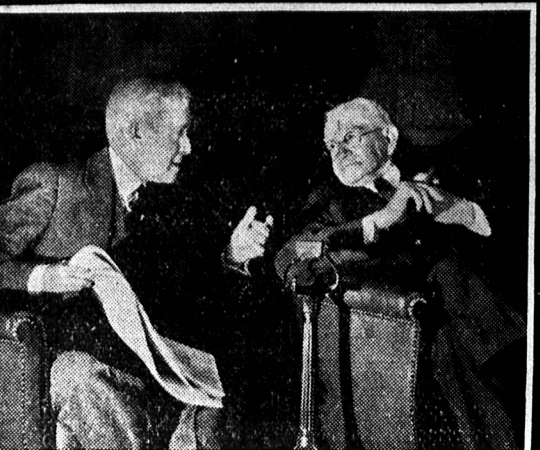

JUDGE'S RULING FAVORS MODERN BATHING SUITS

CHICAGO, June 22—Municipal Judge Elliott has decided to be modern in the matter of bathing suits for girls. He looked over a 1910 ordinance prescribing bloomer suits for female bathers and then took a look at pictures of a 1932 creation and said:

"Personally, I like the modern one. The ordinance should be changed. Why a girl would sink if she dressed according to the regulations laid down by the City Council."

With these remarks he dismissed a case against Miss Dorothy Reeder, who attired herself in an ultra-modern bathing suit recently and had herself arrested to test the antiquated law. The 1910 law is the only one the city has for regulation of bathing suits, and it was reinstated as a result of a parliamentary mixup.

It was described by Charlotte Slavitt, woman lawyer representing Miss Reeder, as "archaic and ridiculous, proving the inability of the City Council to determine what is proper bathing garb."

Genius And Twisted Mentality

NEW YORK, June 22—The stories behind some of the books catalogued as "Eccentric Literature" in the New York Public Library are told by Walter Hart Blumenthal in an article, "An Alcove for Allenists," just published in Part X of The Colophon, a book collectors' quarterly.

Mr. Blumenthal declares that many of the writers whose minds were partly touched by insanity were contented and well able to defend themselves and notes that between genius and twisted mentality the border had often been narrow.

"What should be said, for instance, of Friedrich Nietzsche?" he asks. 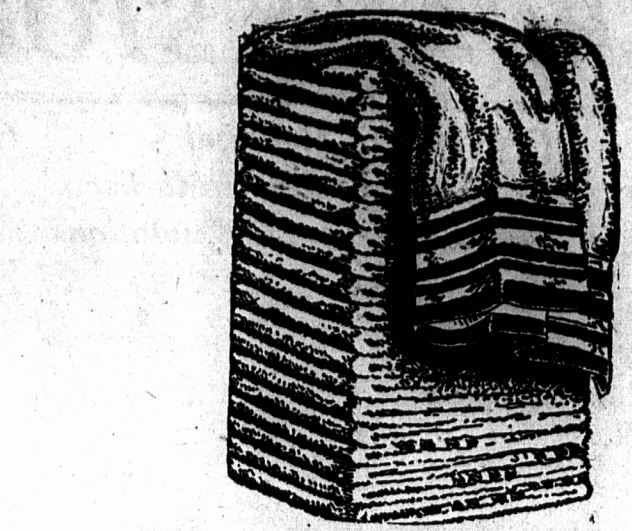
