KING EDWARD OPENS THE IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT

The Speech Contains Few Surprises but Something for Ireland, New Constitution for the Transvaal and Suspension of Chinese Labor—Chamberlain Makes a Fighting Speech and Premier Replies—Mr Balfour to be Opposed in London

LONDON, Feb. 19.—(Special).—King Edward opened Parliament today with the usual ceremony and following his speech the debate waxed warm. The speech contained no great surprises. Several matters of minor interest were referred to, but among them was the statement that a new constitution for the Transvaal would be drawn up as soon as possible and in the meantime the importations of Chinese would be suspended.

The speech stated that the Ministers are considering a plan for improving the system of Government of Ireland and for introducing thereto some means for associating the people with the conduct of their affairs. In the debate which followed Mr. Chamberlain delivered a fighting speech, attacking the Government on all points and especially on their South African policy. He threw down the gauntlet regarding Home Rule and in tariff matters promised to make things warm. The Premier's reply was lengthy and good natured, the speaker assuming that his position was so strong that he could afford to be generous. The debate was continued at a great length by other speakers. The Liberals have selected Thomas Bowles to oppose Mr. Balfour in London. Mr. Balfour commenced his active campaign today.

PRISONS NOW SHOW PLACES

St. PETERSBURG, Feb. 17.—Five famous political prisoners, the last inmates of the Schlusselburg Fortress, were taken from their cells last night and sent to Siberia to serve the remainder of their sentences. They were Karpovich, who killed Minister of Education Bogoleff in 1901, for forcibly enrolling student demonstrators in the army; Gershinin and Melnikoff, accomplices in the assassination of Interior Minister Sipiaguine, and organizers of the fighting organization of the social revolutionists; Sazonoff, the murderer of Interior Minister Von Plehve, and his accomplice, Sekorsky. The sentences have been materially ameliorated by the Emperor's amnesty decree of November last.

CHURCH ARMY IMMIGRANTS

LONDON, Feb. 17.—The Church Army is appealing to the public for half a million dollars to carry on emigration of the unemployed to Canada. In a letter to the press the Secretary points out that the army is devoting \$50,000 this season to this work. For \$50 a head they undertake to transport the emigrant from his home in England to a home in Canada. "We don't" they affirm, "purpose to send out any but such as are able and willing to work and to conduct themselves properly. In cases of doubt candidates will be subjected to a rigorous test."

The name of the proposed candidate has not yet been announced, but Thomas Gibson Bowles, who represented Kings Lynn in the last parliament, is supposed by many Liberals to be the man who is likely to effect a combination of the Unionist and Liberal Free Traders.

CARTRIDGES FOR PHILIPPINES

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 18.—An order for 4,000,000 ball cartridges has been received from the Ordnance Department at the Frankford Arsenal here. They are to be of 30-calibre for Krug-Jorgensen rifles. Although no official information could be obtained at the arsenal as to the reason for the large additional order for cartridges it is understood they are intended for the troops in the Philippines. It is intimated that the increased order is in anticipation of possible trouble in China.

LONDON, Feb. 17.—King Edward told the Rev. Wilson Carrile, head of the church army, who was received in audience at Buckingham Palace today, that he often worked twelve hours a day and greatly sympathized with the unemployed. Therefore it was a great comfort to His Majesty to know that the church army was furnishing work for so many. The King specially praised the emigration plans of the army and said to the Rev. Carrile: "Encourage your good emigrants. Wish them from me every happiness that work can produce. They will still be in my dominions and their emigration will not only benefit themselves and their families, but the whole empire."

INTERCOLONIAL REFORMATION

A First-Class Detective Service, Increase in Long Distance Passenger Fares and Commercial Traveller's Rates, and Coal Handling Facilities May Save a Million.

OTTAWA, Feb. 19.—(Special).—A first-class detective service will be established on the Intercolonial with E. A. Williams of Montreal as Chief. This is for the purpose of stopping the series of petty robberies now taking place, as well as for the general efficiency of the road. An increase will be made on passenger rates for distances exceeding two hundred miles. Under that distance the rates are now the same as on other roads, but the long distance rates are low and will be made equal to the others.

An increase will also be made in the rate given commercial travellers which is lower than elsewhere. Another improvement in the management will be the establishment of coal-handling facilities on the water front at St. John, Newcastle, Campbellton, Lewis River du Loup and Halifax. Coal contracts will be made for delivery at these places. At present the Intercolonial takes delivery at the mines and does its own hauling. It is estimated that from \$750,000 to one million will be saved by this method.

LOW WAGES IN GERMANY

LONDON, Feb. 17.—The most deplorable state of affairs seems to exist in the toy industry, with its headquarters in the highlands of the beautiful Thuringian provinces. There are thousands of men, women and children at work on an industry whose products are to give pleasure to others, and they themselves are plunged 1 1/2 ind's ribbible want. The death rate of Germany as a whole is from ten to twelve per 1,000. In the Thuringian highlands it is nineteen per 1,000. It is that district of Germany most stricken with tuberculosis. It will hardly be believed that a common rate of wages there is 2 1/2-pf, per hour for this home industry. The highest rate paid seems to be 35pf. The working day seems to average fourteen hours. The average wage, 15pf, is a trifle over 3 cents per hour.

STATES WONT ARBITRATE

LONDON, Feb. 17.—A despatch to Daily Telegraph from Algieras says "Mr. White (United States ambassador to Italy, and one of the American delegates, to the Algieras convention, informed me that the rumors that the United States will arbitrate the differences between France and Germany are absolutely imaginary. As I understand the matter, in the event of a failure to reach an understanding, Mr. White thinks it would be best to terminate the conference rapidly."

WILL SAIL FOR LIPTON CUP

HONOLULU, Feb. 18.—C. L. Tatt of Colorado Springs has entered the yacht Anemone for the proposed race from San Francisco to Honolulu for the cup given by Sir Thomas Lipton. The Anemone is now on her way from New York for San Francisco around Cape Horn. The Anemone is the auxiliary Ketch, formerly owned by John Murray Mitchell of the New York Yacht Club, and recently sold to C. L. Tatt. She sailed from New York nearly a month ago to round the Horn under her own sail. The trip itself for a craft of her type is a noteworthy undertaking. She is 112 feet over all, 91 feet on the water line, and 19 feet 8 inches beam. She would be eligible for the Lipton Cup by having her propeller removed.
