St. Dunstan's University Annual Field Day

St. Dunstan's University annual Field Day, which was held on the spacious campus overlooking the college, yesterday was perhaps the most successful held in recent years. The many different events were keenly contested by the vast field of competitors who participated in them. A few of the athletes who took part in Tuesday's meet and who made an exceptionally fine showing last year failed to duplicate their performances this year on account of the meeting being held so soon after the strenuous game with the Abbies last Saturday in which they played. Although "Pete" Sullivan showed up well in several events he did not do so well as in previous years, especially last year when he gave his brother Joe a tight go for the "Best all round Senior athlete." The cause for this was that "Pete" was pretty well shaken up after Saturday's game and was not anywhere near the "pink of condition." Perhaps the biggest surprise of the whole meet was the capturing of the "Best all round athlete" prize by Fermin O'Brien a second year student at the University who hails from Rogersville, New Brunswick and who was formerly a student at the University of St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, N. B. In each event he entered O'Brien worked hard and his three weeks training was of great benefit to him. He was also a contestant in the mile run against J. F. Campbell of Brooklyn, N. Y., who not only holds the College record but who came within two seconds of breaking the Maritime record for the mile, the time made being 4 min. 39 1/2 secs. "Jack" also lowered his record of last year by 14 seconds. He did the mile then in 4 minutes 54 1/2 secs., which broke the college record of 5 minutes 15 seconds made by Louis Callaghan two years ago. Campbell also broke the half mile and quarter mile records yesterday doing the first in 2 minutes 6 1/4 seconds, just a quarter of a second behind the Maritime record for the half and running the quarter in exactly 55 seconds. He is the fastest long distance runner seen here in several years and it is doubtful whether in years to come there will be a St. Dunstan's athlete who can duplicate what Campbell accomplished yesterday. "Jack" also came within two points of capturing the prize for the "Best all round" man. It is also stated that had he been placed in both the mile and half mile events he would have broken the Maritime record for the quarter high jump was very closely contested between McCarron of Charlottetown and D. Johnson from Boston, Mass., being won by the former who made the highest jump of five feet. In the Senior broad jump, C. Jenkins also of Charlottetown won this event, jumping the distance of 16 feet, 6 inches. He failed, however, to come up to last year's mark of 17 feet 7 inches made by "Joe" Sullivan. McCarthy the big senior classman took the 220 yard dash with ease passing Doyle near the finish of the 100 yard dash line and retaining the lead to the end. His time was 25 seconds equalling that made by J. Sullivan last year. Doyle captured the 100 yard dash, beating "Pete" Sullivan out by a few inches in the finals. One of the most interesting and feature events of the day was the relay race between the class teams which was won by the sixth year men. This team was comprised of the four leading runners of the class namely, Sullivan, Pineau, Murtagh and McCarthy. Third year came second in this race and it was only by a small margin that McCarthy beat Johnson to the tape. The last event on the programme was the handball tournament of the Senior being won by Vincent Pineau and "Flat" Collins both of whom are clever players and the Junior tournament was won by Fermin O'Brien and Brinsley Johnston. Pineau is an exceptional and clever player, having learned and perfected the art at the University of St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, N. B. The junior events were also entered into with a vim and were well contested. Ralph Hackett of Tignish captured the prize for the best all round junior athlete. Bruce stated that a company with head office here has been formed with authorized capital of \$2,500,000 to develop mineral and coal areas located at Codroy on the west coast of Newfoundland in St. Georges Bay district. The company is known as the Little River Coal Mining Company, Limited of St. Georges and development operations are to be started at once. Arrangements are now being made to purchase property and a diamond drill will be started this fall.
