The minutes of the last monthly meeting and also of the last annual meeting were read and approved. The treasurer, Mrs. Maurice Perry (Sr.) read the financial statement for the year, showing receipts of \$556.13 and expenditures of \$478.52, leaving a balance on hand of \$77.61.

B., on the historic Isthmus of Chignecto, the geographical centre of the Maritime Provinces, and an area as rich as any of similar size in North America. Near by are the fertile marshes of the Tantramar, made famous by the writings of Sir Charles D. G. Roberts. In the midst of this historic and beautiful setting, Mount Allison stands as a living monument to its founder Charles F. Allison in July 1840, and to all men and women of vision who by their work and generosity caused it to grow and prosper until the college plant now amounts to about five million dollars in value and the student body numbers about 1400. Mount A is the product of a faith expressed in works — the kind of a faith that from generation to generation has taken as its text: "And the Lord said unto Moses, wherefore criest thou unto Me. Speak unto the children of Israel that they go forward."
