PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT.

Of twenty-six Presidents of the United States fifteen were of distinctly English ancestry, five of Scotch-Irish, three of Scotch, one of Welsh and two of Dutch ancestry. President Roosevelt is one of the two latter. To find the other we have to go back to Martin Van Buren who was inaugurated in 1837, the year in which Queen Victoria ascended the throne. The new President is distinguished in other ways as one of the five Vice Presidents who have come to occupy the Presidential chair without having been directly elected thereto. It is also pointed out that though younger than almost all of his predecessors in office Mr. Roosevelt has a larger family of children than any previous occupant of the White House, and as that notable residence has only five sleeping apartments there will be some difficulty in bestowing his family of eight, with nurse, governess, maid and housekeeper. In fact it is claimed that the White House must be enlarged at the earliest practicable date on this account.

Well-educated, ambitious, possessed of an ample fortune and committed as he is to a life of strenuous activity, one of the first thoughts that occurred to many when he became President was that Mr. Roosevelt would naturally aspire to a second term. It is true indeed that no Vice President who succeeded to the Presidential chair had hitherto been afterward elected to that position. But these precedents are not binding, and some one put the question directly to Mr. Roosevelt, whether he would seek another term? His answer was somewhat enigmatic and has been variously interpreted. He said: "I am not now in any sense a candidate. If I fall in my present duties I cannot hope for future honors."

It was first said that he had positively declined to consider a nomination. His words will not reasonably bear any such construction. On the contrary the meaning of his words reasonably interpreted is that he looks forward to making his administration so successful that without any direct seeking on his part, a nomination and election to succeed himself will come to him in due time. It is well known that down to the time of the President's murder Mr. Roosevelt had been an aspirant for the Republican nomination for President in 1904. But the situation has now entirely changed. If he were now to actually promote plans to secure a nomination he would probably defeat his own purpose. He will therefore rely solely upon the success of his administration, hoping in that way to attain the object of his ambition, which is to become President by the choice of the nation.

To that end Mr. Roosevelt has retained the entire Cabinet which President McKinley left behind him, and has announced his intention of carrying out in its entirety the policy of the late President. This action was a surprise to the many who had expected sweeping changes in the Cabinet with probably the adoption of some radical new departure in domestic or foreign policy. None the less his action is approved as wise and judicious and has at the outset of his career increased the public confidence. By so much it has also increased his chances of the nomination three years hence. Of Mr. Roosevelt's administrative ability the nation was already assured. There was some doubt, however as to his discretion. Already he has done much to convince

the country that he is a safe man as well as an able one.

Sir Louis Davies has formally taken leave of the officials of his Department and will take his seat on the Bench at the next sitting of the Supreme Court. He is thus out of politics for good. In our case the sense of satisfaction over his promotion is considerably abated by the sense of the loss which the Province must needs suffer politically. Sir Louis was a most energetic, faithful and successful worker for his Province and there are few if any who could fill his place with such advantage to the people of his native land. His own views as to the succession are pretty generally known, but the matter is one for the people themselves to determine.

It is given out by Mayor Prefontaine of Montreal that the Government had recommended him and Mayor Parent of Quebec for Knighthood but that the Governor General did not sanction the recommendation. Whether this is true or not we do not know. But it is true that the British Government which is primarily responsible for such imperial honors as may be conferred in Canada is not bound by the recommendations of Premier Laurier and his colleagues. If the matter were one of making an appointment within the gift of the Canadian Government, Lord Minto would doubt have been governed by the advice of his Council.
