The Island hockeyist and golf star will turn out with Beavers again tomorrow and may be seen in action against Dartmouth Arrows here Saturday in a Maritime Senior Hockey League fixture. Dowling plays centre and left wing.

Dowling, brother of "Mouse," now performing for Sydney Millionaires in the Cape Breton Hockey League, was with North Sydney Victorias last year and early this season. Two years ago he was with the Maritime Intermediate champion Charlottetown Legionnaires. He had two years of hockey under the coaching of Gordie Drillon, former N.H.L. ace.

A short, stocky, hard player, Dowling said he had asked for his release from North Sydney because of dissatisfaction with playing conditions on that team.

He is the current New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island open and amateur golf champion, and has played on two Willingdon Cup teams.

Navy Defeats S'side All-Stars 11-5 In City Hockey League Game



One of the main sporting events for the near future being discussed by local fans is the referees and coaches school which gets underway here on Tuesday, December 7th, under the capable direction of King Clancy and Pete Kelly.

The school, which will provide three days of expert instruction on hockey rules, refereeing and coaching as well as on the finer points of how our National sport should be played, by these two men who are highly qualified to teach, is creating a widespread interest among old and young alike, who are looking forward to the opening of the school with much enthusiasm.

The Department of Physical Fitness under the energetic guidance of Brigadier "Bill" Reid has been the driving factor behind the promotion of this school. The Department combined with the Clancy, president of the National Hockey League, King Clancy and Pete Kelly, is bringing to this Province for the first time something that has the potentialities of lifting Island hockey standards to a higher plane.

According to recent reports Jack Dempsey, former heavyweight champion of the World, has not lost his zeal for action in the squared circle. For the first time in several years he donned boxing gloves at the National A. A. A. gymnasium in Montreal recently with Laurent Dauthuille, French middleweight who will soon fight Pete Zaduk in Montreal. Dempsey boxed two long rounds, and according to reports, was stepping along in surprisingly good style.

Judging from recent statistics most of the goal scoring in the National Hockey League is done in the second and third periods. In the first 42 games of the current season there were 227 goals scored and out of these 227 goals, 64 were scored in the first period, 81 in the second and 82 in the third. Four clubs, Boston, Chicago, Canadiens and Rangers enjoyed their greatest scoring prowess in the second period while Detroit found the third period more to its liking. Toronto was equally successful in both the first and third chapters.

Boston Bruins scored 18 of their 44 goals in the second stanza. This was the greatest number of goals scored by one team in any single period. Bruins dropped one to 17 in the third frame, which was the most goals scored by a team in that period. It would seem that the Bruins are slow starters as they only scored nine goals in the initial period. Nine goals is the least scored in any one period by a team, but three clubs, Boston, Chicago and Rangers all scored this amount in the opening canto.

Montreal Canadiens follow Boston in number of goals scored with 40. The Habitants garnered their tallies by way of 12 in the first period, 15 in the second and 13 in the third. It was the middle period that proved most productive to the Montrealers. Chicago Black Hawks scored 15 of their 38 goals in the second period. They scored nine in the first and 13 in the third.

New York Rangers, fourth club to find their shooting irons in the best of trim in the second period, scored 12 of their 32 goals in this 20-minute session. Rangers notched nine goals in the first and 11 in the third. Fifteen of the 38 goals scored by Detroit Red Wings came in the final frame. This was three goals more than the Red Wings
