**London Letter**

LONDON, July 3.—His Majesty King George the Fifth has made a couple of friends. Two young women from overseas.

Riding in Rotten Row the other morning—Rotten Row is the famous ride in Hyde Park—he observed two young women trying to snap him with their cameras as he passed the man his horse. They were badly placed, and on the wrong side of the tan gallop, to get a good photograph.

His Majesty, seeing them struggling with their 'sights', rode across to them and said: "I am afraid you cannot get a good one from that point—take one from here." Then he halted his mount for the two amateurs to avert themselves as well as an obvious fit of nerves would allow, of that unique chance to get a private close-up of the King for their very own.

"Is that all right?" he asked, when the cameras had duly clicked, and, receiving graceful little curtsies from the two young women, trotted off.

The divinity that doth hedge a king may not be in active working order in these days, but there is nevertheless some things which makes our king safer in his capital to mix unguarded and in a friendly way with his people than any other monarch or president in the world. That is beyond question.

Is there a time coming when we must establish a society for the prevention of cruelty to M. P.'s? It looks like it. And there may have to be special protection for Labour members.

It appears that M. P.'s complain with an exceeding bitterness of the number of applications for subscriptions which they receive, based upon various social happenings in their constituencies. According to one harrassed legislator, the sole occupation of his constituents is that of writing to him for his patronage—and still more urgently for his subscriptions—for some function or other. Another says that he should not have conceived it possible that there could take place in the whole of the British Isles such a number of flower shows and whist drives and mothers' meetings as appear to be held in the area he represents in Parliament.

Yet another M. P. says that, having subscribed to the general fund of a carnival to be held in his constituency, he has in one week received no less than twenty six applications for subscriptions from as many committees, each of which is in charge of some sort of 'side show' at the same carnival.

Added to this, the cricket, football, tennis and other clubs in the neighborhood appear to think that they have a special and preferential claim upon the pocket of their Parliamentary representative.

The Labor M. P.'s complain the most. The explanation of this may be that, to the working folk whom they claim especially to represent, the member of Parliament's official salary of \$2,000 a year seems wealth untold.

Talking of subscriptions by M. P.'s to their constituents, there is a reverse side to the picture. It is that of subscriptions by voters to M. P.'s

For instance, we must club together and buy a copy of hymns ancient and modern for the use of a certain member. He is the Right Honorable James Ramsay MacDonald, Socialist member for the Seaham division of Durham. Prime Minister.

The other night, in the midst of a group of supporters anxious to know this and that about matters which he did not wish them to know, Mr. MacDonald took from his wallet a piece of paper. On that paper were inscribed the numbers—the final numbers—of the parties at the last general election. He announced that one of his daughters had looked up the numbers of the corresponding hymns in the book

of hymns, ancient and modern, and that they formed a curious commentary on party fortunes. Thus, he said, the party figures were, and the hymn numbers were:

Labour 288, "A few more years shall roll."  
Conservatives 254, "Weary of earth and laden with my sins."  
Liberals 54, "When shades of night around us close."  
Keeping a very straight face the Prime Minister said that he had kept that scrap of paper ever since and had derived much comfort therefrom, and he suggested that his followers should study that oracle.

But Mr. MacDonald forgot how assiduously some of us peruse our hymn books and how closely we follow the general election figures. Otherwise he would have known that the latest figures at the general election were not 288, 254 and 54 respectively, but 287 and 260. For present purposes we may leave the Liberals out in "the shades of night."

And so we get, not the hymn book results which so comforted "Ramsay Mac," but:

Labour, 287 "Thou are gone to the grave and we will not deplore thee."  
Conservative, 260: "Oh make our sad divisions soon to cease . . . more blessed still in peace and love to be."  
The P. M. should have checked his daughter's observations more closely.
