War Transforms Type Of Major League Play

NEW YORK, June 26 — (AP) — The war has been responsible for a complete transformation in the type of play in the National and American Leagues.

Long recognized as the pitching loop, with accent on defence, the senior circuit has done an about-face, with the hitters enjoying a banner season this year. The Junior circuit also has undergone a face-lifting switching from a hitters' paradise to a pitchers' league.

A check of the figures shows the National League hit for the first time since 1930, a distinct batting edge over the American League, 351 to 346 and has more 300 hitters, 17 to eight. Last year was the only one in the past 15 that National outbatted the American, and then only by one point.

CHICAGO, June 26 — (AP) — Chicago White Sox, who haven't won an American League pennant since 1919, may not win another this year, but manager Jimmy Dykes says they're going to make it plenty tough on the other teams of the League before next October.

Dykes was pretty proud of his club as he came back home today for a two-week stand, after winning 11 and losing 10 in the last two weeks.

"We've got good pitching and our hitting is better than fair," Dykes said as he prepared for tomorrow's invasion of Boston Red Sox in a three-game series in a fight for third place. "We've got up there now, and maybe we won't get up there. But we'll cause some of them a lot of trouble along the way."

Dykes will have his team at home for two weeks and the White Sox have had more than ordinary success on their home grounds this year.

Citation For Military Medal

Citations covering thirty awards previously announced to officers and men of the Canadian Army serving overseas were released yesterday by the Department of National Defense. They included Ernest Augustus Stanley, 25, Charlottetown, who was awarded the Military Medal.

Mr. Stanley died during the attack on February 19, 1945 on the coast covering the approaches to Calcar, Argentina—died in the line of duty. He was in charge of the line detachment with members of the Canadian Infantry Division Signals.

Assault Case In Supreme Court

The case of the King versus J. Stanford Biggar was not concluded when Supreme Court adjourned yesterday evening but the evidence for the Crown and the defense had been finished and R. R. Bell, defense counsel, had concluded his address to the jury.

The Court adjourned till 10:30 this morning.

Biggar is accused of having assaulted and caused bodily harm to one Harold McLeellan on the night of December 14 last at or near Biggar's store on the corner of Chestnut Street and Elm Avenue. McLeellan was taken to the P. R. Island Hospital where he remained in a state of semi-consciousness for several weeks.

The Justice, E. Arsenault presided at the trial and the Crown was represented by Attorney General F. A. Lange and G. R. Holmes. Seven witnesses were heard for the Crown and two, including the accused, for the defense.

The evidence of George Shephard, who worked for Biggar, and that of Hector MacQuarrie, 261 Flannery Street, agreed on the point that at no time between 10:30 and 11 o'clock on the night of October 14 last was there any crowd in front of Biggar's store.

The evidence of Herman Feavour, 18 Bishop Street, contradicted the evidence of Shephard and MacQuarrie. Feavour said that between 10:30 and 11 o'clock on the night of Oct. 14 last, he saw a crowd of about 40 persons, including men, women and children standing near Biggar's store while a man lying in a gutter nearby was being lifted by some person whom the witness was unable to recognize on account of the darkness.

At the conclusion of the Crown's case the Justice established a prima facie case. Mr. Justice Arsenault said he was inclined to agree with the defense counsel but since the case was not established, he thought it better to continue the case.

When the Court opens this morning, the Attorney General will follow the jury. His address will be followed by His Lordship charging the jury.

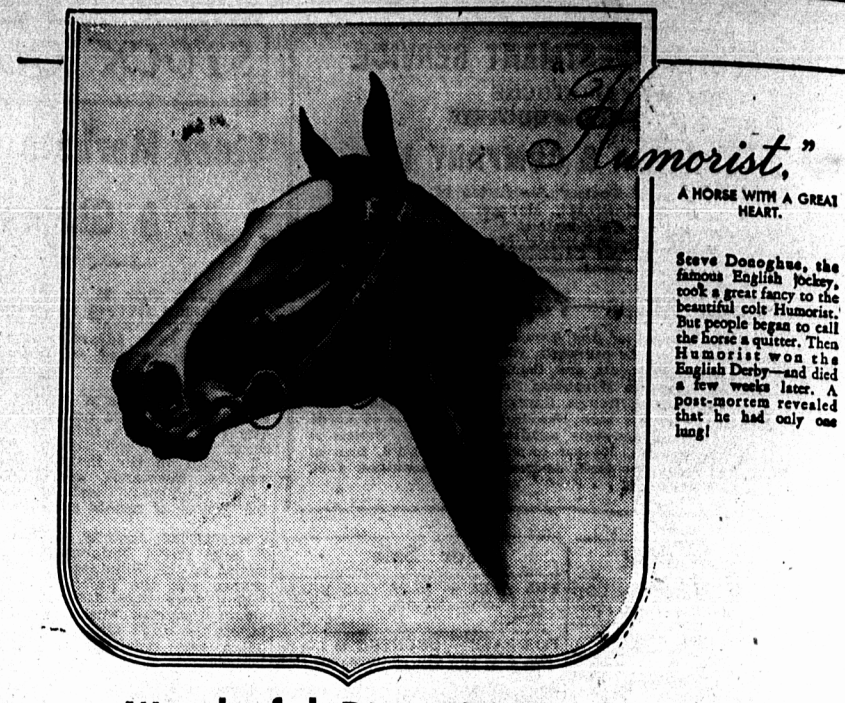

Blind, Deaf, But Leads Happy Life

REGINA MAN MASTERS HANDICAPPED DOUBLE

REGINA, June 26 (CP) — Charlie Ross, who lives at the Nash Hotel, is a man who is both blind and deaf. He is totally blind and unable to hear a sound, now is mastering one more handicraft to help him lead as interesting a life as possible.

Last month he began learning to teach the blind in Saskatchewan for 24 years. Ross' case is one of the most difficult as he has had to learn to read by tracing letters on his palm.

Standing beside Ross as he finished a case chair seat, Miss Liggett said he was a quick and enthusiastic pupil. He has learned two systems of alphabets for the blind, and is an avid reader.

Ross is looking forward to the time when old rubber tires will again be available from which to make rubber mats seen at so many homes for the blind here and there. Chair-making is a skill a blind person may acquire with ease—but the cane chair fashion is a thing of the past, and the workshop here does not get enough orders to keep even one man busy.

In the morning Ross works at his chair caning. Later he reads for a few hours and unable to see or hear traffic, goes for a walk by himself in the evenings. Somehow he manages to find his way about the streets safely, and Miss Liggett said he finds life interesting and entertaining. Never has she come upon him unhappy or out of sorts.

Polish Gov't In London Protests

LONDON, June 26 (AP) — The Polish Government in London today denounced the newly-formed "National Unity" administration of Warsaw as a "pseudo-government" and declared it would cling to its claim of authority to speak for the Polish nation.

The declarations were made in a formal note handed to all Allied governments except Russia. Meanwhile, other Polish leaders gathering in Warsaw were expected to announce soon the exact make-up of the new Polish administration agreed upon in talks in Moscow.

Many quarters expect Britain and the United States to recognize this new administration.
