SOME LEADING CANADIAN ORATORS

(Continued from page 1.)

his words. Of what he said I was not able to gauge the accuracy—do doubt he put the best end of his case forward—but for more than an hour and a half he kept his audience wrapped in attention whilst he set forth the record of the seven years administration of the Laurier Government. It is a sweeping thing to say, but I do not think I ever listened to any speaker who gave me a greater sense of his knowledge and power. One felt one was listening to a man who knew things, who did things. There was the quiet confidence of known strength about his talk. After he had spoken for more than an hour and half he seemed as full of information of his subject as when he commenced. His language whilst plain, was singularly exact. His sentences were always complete, however long. He indulged in only one vulgarism "soft snap" His voice was not smooth, and he seemed to exert it unnecessarily, so that draughts of water punctuated his speech, but to the very end he held the close attention of his audience, who he had lifted up to take a high and statesmanlike view on the events of the last seven years of Canadian Government. It must be understood that I am not expressing here any preference for the policy of Mr. Fielding over that enunciated by Mr. Forster. As an Englishman of only three months residence here I have not the knowledge of local politics necessary to form any opinion upon the merits of the opposing programs of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Borden. I am simply speaking of the manner in which these two men set out their views—I am regarding them solely as exponents of a policy, not as creators or administrators of it.

"THE MAN FOR ME."

The reputation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier as an orator stands so high in England that I went to hear him at the Monument National the other day with great expectation. I was not lucky in securing a place from which to listen to him with ease or to hear him with clearness. Jammed in at the back of the ground floor circle, amongst his enthusiastic and pre-arranged admirers, I heard the eloquent periods of Sir Wilfrid, balanced first on one leg and then on the other, a state of precarious equilibrium which was time after time upset by the surging of the crowd as some storm of applause swept over it. But it needed no nearer view or more easy vantage-point to reveal almost at once the nature-made orator. Here for the first time in Canada were the real gestures of the mover of men. The sweep of the arm, the leonine pose and throw of the head, and the impassioned smiting of the breast caught the audience, who were time and again lifted out of themselves by the sudden rush of eloquence with which the Premier ended his best periods. The efforts were exhausting and repeatedly the speaker mopped his shining forehead with his handkerchief, but seeming to gain strength as he went along, and raising the personal note of his health, his love for the common people, his love for Canada, he swept the three thousand listeners along with him until when he sat down after an hour's speech, they leaped to their feet and cheered him to the echo.

"That's my man—that's the man for me," cried out, in a loud voice, a work-stained mechanic, with his face aglow with emotion, and again and again he shouted out, and his neighbors could not silence him. There was seen the work

of the brain crator, who alone can touch the heart of man and thrill every nerve in the body. The rough workman round about me were all moved; their hearts had been touched. As a reasoned defence of his administration, or as a clear expression of future policy Sir Wilfrid's speech did not greatly impress one when read quietly next day in the paper. If I were taking the platform in this campaign as a Government candidate, I should prefer to take Mr. Fielding rather than Sir Wilfrid as my guide but as an orator, which is the only respect in which I am now considering him, Sir Wilfrid takes a foremost place amongst living men. The few words he spoke in English were pure and beautifully enunciated.

THE AUDIENCES

As to the Canadian audience, of which I have been a member, I think they are quicker to take a point than those at home, and more inclined to repeat interruption. I never at any of the meetings saw or heard a point miss fire, whilst in one case where Mr. Fielding, having the facts on his side, said naively: "I must tell the truth," the audience caught at a piece of humor, which I think the speaker did not intend. At home we are accustomed to interruptions, and tolerate interruptions, unless they become obstructive, but here I have found a disposition to cry down any attempt at "heckling." Mr. Tarte and Mr. Forster seemed to me particularly happy and prompt at repartee, the latter bringing the house down by telling a noisy adherent of Sir Wilfrid's, who disented from some statement put into the mouth of his chief, that he preferred to take the word of the Prime Minister in this matter against that of his friend. In conclusion I must say that I have gained as much pleasure as instruction from the meetings which I have attended here in Montreal during the last three months.
