PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Mr. Chairman, Your Excellency, Rev. Fathers, ladies and gentlemen:

Today another school year comes to a close and for the time it is my duty and privilege to present to you a report of the activities of this school for the year 1941-42.

Today we are approaching the most serious crisis in the history of the civilized world, and the immediate future is dark indeed. When this present great conflict began, this school had suffered through the loss of the administrative head, Mr. MacDonald, and Mr. Morrossey. Since we assembled here one year ago, this school again has lost its administrative head, and although we felt and still feel the loss by their departure, nevertheless we have a feeling of great pride when we realize that they have nobly responded to our country's call and are assisting in carrying the torch of victory. They are nobly doing their part in the defence of democracy, of liberty, yes, in fact of everything that is cherished by liberty loving people. While in the teaching profession in this province those four men by their integrity had moved to the foremost ranks in their fight for freedom these same qualities have continued to add new laurels to them. We were pleased to learn that Capt. L. F. MacDonald, now overseas, has been promoted to the rank of major; Pilot Officer McKinnon to the rank of Flying Officer, 2nd Lieut. Doucette now overseas to Lieutenant, and that Major Morrossey still holds a responsible position in Ottawa. The teachers and pupils of this school also regretted the departure during the year of one of their very best teachers, Rev. Dr. McMahon. Father McMahon had always taken a very keen interest and active part in the activities of this school. During the year McMahon's presence in the school classes he kept a close check on each and every boy and endeavored to entice and enable him to put forth the very best effort possible. And here I wish to pay tribute to Rev. Dr. McMahon and extend to him on behalf of the staff and pupils our appreciative thanks for the keen interest and concern he had shown, and in his new field of labor we wish him every success and happiness.

When school reopened last Sept. Mr. MacCallum was acting principal and Mr. Doucette who had leave until October last did not return to his post during this school year. During November Mr. MacCallum received his commission in the R.C.A.P. and was granted leave of absence by the school board for the duration of the war. It was with considerable timidity that I assumed the responsibilities of the principalship in December last.

We are not troubled with tardiness and deliberate truancy to any great extent, due to the untiring efforts and vigilance of Mr. Brawlers, but nevertheless we still have some parents who permit their children to remain away from school without sufficient reason thus engendering in the youthful minds a spirit of indifference.

The results of the war still continue to make matters difficult in the school as well as in the homes. Due to the fact that many fathers are absent on military service we find that parental guidance and control is lacking in some cases. In the senior grade there is the desire on the part of many to join and follow the example of Mr. MacMillan and the late Joseph Reardon. Although we commend those prospective deserters for their patriotism nevertheless it greatly hinders the academic work of the school.

The co-operation of the school board and of the parents, Rev. J. W. McCordie we held supervised study periods during the winter and the spring four evenings each week for the purpose of endeavoring to counteract and offset many of the distractions with which the boys are met, and to assist them in every way possible with their difficulties. Many of the pupils took advantage of this opportunity by it but too many of the remainder failed to do their part. Probably too much is being done for them.

I desire to remind parents that their children have received assignments each day—something to do as well as learn—and it is a parental duty to see to it that the remainder of the day is spent properly and in the home.

Under the capable supervision of Mr. Barlow the manual training dept. continues to do splendid work.

The passing of our present curriculum law is a splendid move in the proper direction and its enforcement is being actively and heartily supported and co-operation of all our citizens.

During the year we had several visits from their parents, and we visited our boys to greater effect. I refer in particular to Rev. Richard O'Neill, a former pupil of this school, who visited the school in the White Fathers of North Africa. The past year had also seen the increased use of motion pictures in the school. Each class was shown a series of pictures depicting various phases of our war effort: refugee children, our industries, and our men of national importance. These were very educational and very entertaining and to Miss Gillis, we extend our sincere thanks.

Rev. Douglas MacNeill of North River, Ontario, visited the school in the month of November. His pictures of a religious nature, those too were appreciated and instructive.

We have had a number of visits from members of the school board, including the chairman Dr. Yeo. The kindly interest of Dr. Yeo is evidenced by his words of encouragement and much to help along the work. We are very pleased to receive these visits and we hope in future that their visits will be more numerous.

Pitting observance of Remembrance Day and Empire and other days were made in connection with the other city schools. On each occasion a suitable program was arranged and a speaker provided. Our thanks to Mr. Leonard Goodwin and Mr. James Revie Jr. are justly due for their splendid addresses on those occasions.

Very Principals Callaghan in a most capable manner acted as instructor in cadet work. In previous years there had been keen rivalry between West Kent and Queen Square Corps. Competition is a splendid thing to stimulate efficiency, but rivalry bordering on unfriendliness is very undesirable. This year the two corps were amalgamated at the Charlottetown Cadet Battalion and splendid results were accomplished. That the turnout on inspection day was a success was quite evident from the many favorable comments by the large number of citizens who witnessed the manoeuvres.

Our school kitchen continued to function as in previous years with 150 boys being supplied with extra nourishment each day. To Capt. Archibald MacDonal, G.S.S.R., to Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, to the Knights of Columbus, to Mr. Alfred Doyle, to Mr. Frank Eden, and to all others who contributed to extend our sincere thanks.

In the absence of Mr. Doucette, Miss Mary Moran with the assistance of Mrs. Joseph Dougan successfully conducted the singing classes during the year.

Activities which always play an important part in the life of a pupil were carried on under the supervision of Mr. Croken. The cadet rifle shooting was also under the supervision of Mr. Croken.

The annual ice sports were again a decided success. To the merchant and others who contributed to our program, to Dr. P. O. Dougan, who so generously donated the splendid trophy, and to Father Louis Dougan for prize money the boys are indeed grateful and the success of those sports is due chiefly to their generosity.

The Queen Square Bowling League functioned again this year. The boys thoroughly enjoyed this sport and are very grateful to Rev. Leonard Ayres for the privileges enjoyed and to the Holy Name Club for the trophies so generously donated.

The Teacher's Study Club under the direction of Rev. Ray MacKenzie was organized in the early fall. Regular weekly meetings were held and the results obtained were beyond all praise.

Under the direction of the lady teachers of the staff Red Cross work was carried on with great enthusiasm. A splendid affair was made during the winter. A quantity of handkerchiefs was donated by the pupils of Miss Walsh's class. The Red Cross Victory cards were filled in and forwarded to the British Fund and \$20 to the milk for Britain Fund was subscribed.

The annual Retreat was held again this year at St. Joseph's under the guidance of Rev. John Sullivan. This deserves every commendation and the good results of it are numerous in personal word.

To the honors of medals, prizes, and trophies I extend on behalf of the school sincere thanks, it is indeed a pleasure to remember such a lengthy list made possible only by the interest and generosity of those who help to stimulate that friendly rivalry and competition.

To the prize winners and to all others who worked conscientiously and with sincere congratulations, success may stimulate others to greater efforts in the future.

The members of the senior class who will not return to Queen Square in the fall we bid a friendly farewell. We ask you to carry away the ideals of honesty, integrity and fair play from school without regret that it is not so much what a man has as what he is that counts.

To the members of the staff I desire to express my personal word of appreciation for their splendid spirit of co-operation and goodwill. And at this time I desire to express my appreciation of the teachers and the pupils to our capable caretaker Mr. Murnaghan, for his splendid co-operation and many acts of kindness.

In conclusion I desire to extend to each and every pupil as well as every member of this staff my very best wishes for a pleasant well earned holiday.
