Among The Farmers Federation Of Agriculture News

Before introducing ourselves, we would like to clear up a point that was in the news a week or so ago. The question of why some of the foreign delegates coming to the I.F.A.P. conference did not call to the Island has been asked. Although our provincial Federation had invited them well in advance through the O.P.A. and expected to have those men call, it apparently just could not be arranged. The Department of Agriculture and the Federation on the Island were ready to cater to those visitors and show them around. However, their schedule was such that they had to pass through the Maritimes without seeing our Garden Province. Actually, only very few of the delegates landed in the Maritimes, some at Saint John and some at Halifax. They all wanted to see the Annapolis Valley and after visiting there had to leave on the next train for Quebec City. The delegates from other countries were arriving at Quebec by plane and boat and preparing for the first session of the third World Farmers' Conference.

We are hoping, however, that some of those farmers from other parts of the world will be able to call here on their way home. This of course would have to be after the Guelph conference and their trans-continental tour. Our President, Mr. O'Connor, who is attending the conference, has issued a second special invitation, but nothing definite has been decided upon yet.
