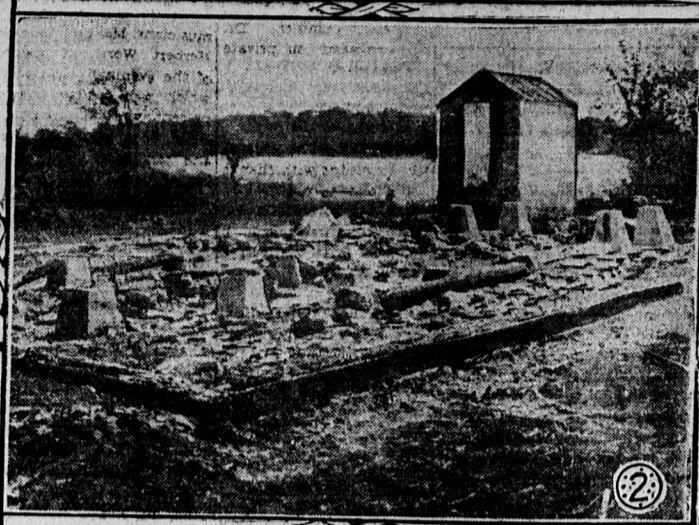
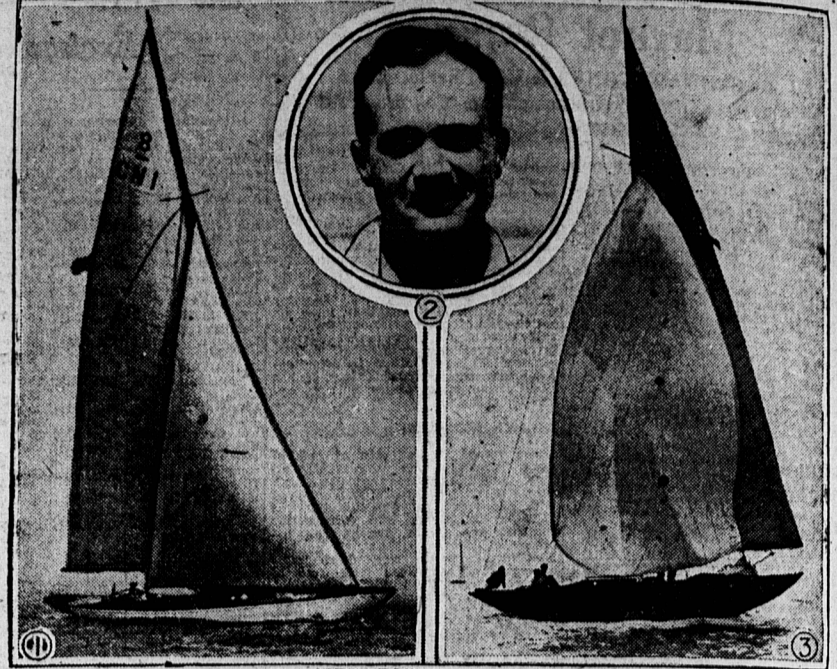


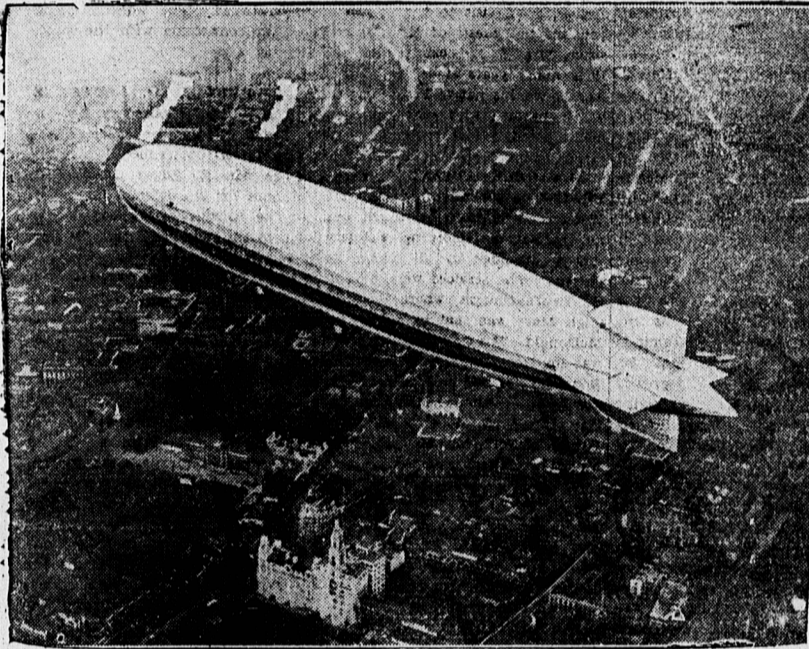
# NEWS OF THE WEEK IN PICTURES FOR GUARDIAN READERS



**BLAZE WIPES OUT TWO-THIRDS OF OSNABRUCK CENTRE—30 HOMELESS**  
A fire, said to have been started by two small children playing with matches, swept through the village of Osnabruck Centre, 20 miles west of Cornwall, Ont. Saturday, Aug. 19, destroying two-thirds of the village and rendering some 30 homeless. Two were injured in the fight against the blaze one seriously. Dried-up wells hampered fire-fighting operations. The damage, which included loss of two churches and town hall, is estimated at \$100,000.
