CANADIAN NOTE CIRCULATION

Dominion note circulation on February 28 was \$290,194,619. Of this total, \$137,115,075 was against approved securities under the provisions of the Finance Act. In answer to questions by J. H. Sinclair in the House of Commons, Sir Henry Drayton furnished this information, and also stated that note circulation on March 31, 1914 was \$117,795,718.

U. S. COAL EXPORTS TO CANADA

Canada imported from the United States last year 20,815,000 tons of coal, or 20 per cent more than during 1919. Of this amount Pennsylvania probably sent 70 per cent. Ontario, which draws from both the Pennsylvania and the Ohio fields, led in the quantity of coal imported.

LOST SPEECH RESTORED

Administration of ether to Ernest Young, former British aviator, under detention in Boston pending an investigation as to his citizenship, brought back his lost power of speech. After being shot down behind the German lines Young became speechless. He subsequently recovered the use of his tongue while in a prison camp. He tumbled from his bed here recently and physicians found that again he could not talk. Dr. Albert Murphy, attached to the medical staff at a Lower Island institution, conceived the idea of ether treatment after he had learned some of Young's history. Young began to talk as soon as he came out of the ether.

STUDENTS ADDRESSED

On March 15, Mr. Simon P. Paoli of L. M. Poole & Co., Charlottetown, gave an interesting address to the Business Students of St. Dunstan's University. Dominion Income Tax Returns. This year the Dominion Government has imposed very heavy penalties upon persons sending in incorrect returns. For instance:—If the income is understated up to one-tenth the real income the fine is 10 per cent interest on the deficiency. If understated by more than 10 per cent but less than 20 per cent the fine is HALF THE AMOUNT OF INCOME OMITTED. If the deficiency is 20 per cent or more, THE WHOLE OF THE UNREPORTED INCOME IS TAKEN. A false statement may be punished with a \$10,000.00 fine and six months in jail. If late in sending in return 25 per cent is added to tax. You must not wait till asked for tax, nor leave the calculation of its amount to Government officials. You must ask for proper form. All returns must be in by April 30th next, accompanied by at least one-fourth of actual tax reckoned liable for. Take no chances. Your return must be perfectly accurate to avoid HEAVY PENALTIES.
