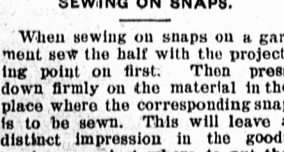

Illinois Wants Boxing Stable

CHICAGO, Dec. 16.—The Illinois State Athletic commission is going to attempt to restrain trade in the cauliflower industry in Chicago, for the purpose, paradoxically as it may seem, of putting the boxing game on a more stable basis.

The reason is because there have been too many promoters, too many promoters, too many promoters, and not enough customers to go around. To customers have resorted to part with high prices for what they regard as mediocre attractions.

But One Show Paid

In the first six months of legalized boxing only one show of major importance had made the promoter any money. That was the match between Shuffle Callahan, a rough, young ex-truck driver, with a deadly left hand wallop when it landed, and Mickey Walker, the former world's welterweight champion. This affair drew \$47,000 and seemed to depend for its popularity upon Callahan's former ability of flattening his opponents in one or two rounds.

Since the enactment of the law legalizing ten round glove fights to a decision, matches of all sorts have been staged. Various promoters have attempted to emulate the success of Tex Rickard, but to date most of them have wound up owing themselves money. The small neighborhood promoters, staking contests in the outlying sections of the city have been the ones who have prospered. This is chiefly because they have charged prices ranging from \$1 to \$3, and the boxers are neighborhood youths who have followings.

To Issue One Permit A Month

Jim Mullin has been the leading promoter in staging contests of minor importance, but the majority of his shows, with the exception of the Callahan-Walker affair, were financial flops. Mullin had an opportunity to recoup his losses with the Bud Taylor-Charley Phil Rosenberg bantamweight match, but the commission ordered the bout cancelled.

Chairman John Righimer of the commission believes that by restricting each promoter to one permit a month, the boxing public will not be defrauded by the sport. He also intends to carefully consider all applicants for permits, and to issue them to promoters considered reliable. There are 43 promoters licensed to operate in Chicago, but most of them have lost all the money they care to lose as a result of their promotional ventures.

The state athletic commission insists on the payment of all purposes by insisting upon the posting of the money in advance of the contest, so that the promoters rather than the boxers or the losers when the house fall short.
