

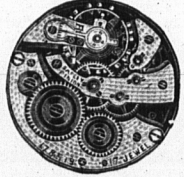

FACTS ABOUT WATCHES

The balance wheel of an average watch makes 3,600 vibrations a minute, 18,000 an hour, 432,000 in a day, or 157,788,000 in a year. At each vibration the balance wheel makes about one and a half revolutions; therefore the arbor or shaft on which the wheel is mounted makes about 236,682,000 revolutions in its bearing in about one year. One drop of oil is sufficient to lubricate from 100 to 200 such bearings. A modern locomotive with 7 ft. driving wheels would have to run 955,824 miles, or more than thirty-nine times around the earth—which, at the rate of a mile a minute without stopping, would take it 683 days, or nearly two years—before the axles of the drivers would make as many revolutions as the balance staff of a watch in a year.

LONDON, Aug 2.—Pope Benedict's plea for an "arranging of aspirations" finds no response in the British press, which rejects, as the Westminster Gazette puts it, the "implication of the Pope that we all equally are involved in a fratricidal struggle, and that all in equal degree are responsible for the origin and outcome of the strife."

"We had no chance in the matter in August, 1914," the newspapers says, "and we have no choice in the matter now."

After citing samples of what it describes as the terrorism and despotism perpetrated by Germany in the year of warfare, the Westminster Gazette says:

"There is no conceivable arranging of aspirations which will meet our view, short of an issue which would make a repetition of these events impossible for the future."

The Pall Mall Gazette writing in a similar vein, and while not questioning the Pope's sincerity or impartiality, remarks:

"But until victory definitely rests on the banner of our alliance the Pope's wish cannot be realized without the deepest wrong to the cause of right and liberty, and peace itself."

ITALIAN PRESS COMMENT.

MILAN, July 30, via Paris, July 31.—The entire press of this city, commencing with the Corriere della Sera, the belligerent countries, and the Pontiff's ardent desire to see the conflict ended.

The Corriere della Sera, however, remarks that any intervention in favour of peace will find an insurmountable obstacle. Namely, the conflict cannot end, except with a victory for the Entente Allies, the conflict being, for them, a defensive war, inspired by pure ideals of liberty and justice. Thus the Pope's appeal, says the newspaper, strikes at those who, for ambition and desire for predominance, are chained war.

REGISTRATION AND CLASSIFICATION OF FOXES

Warning to the Public.

Sir,—In view of the uncertainty in the minds of many people in regard to the Rules and Regulations governing Registration in the Silver Black Fox Breeders' Association which was incorporated last spring by Special Act of the Legislature of the Province, and also because there is a great deal of misunderstanding and misrepresentation regarding the classification adopted by said Association, it seems to me that a word of explanation and warning should be placed before your readers.

The new Fox Breeders' Association in taking over the work of the old one decided for good and valid reasons to abolish the old Classification. Let it be clearly understood, therefore, that such forms as "Class A," "Grade A," etc., have no official meaning at all to-day; and that the Association has rejected the use of them absolutely.

The Association has opened two registers and an Enrolment Book. Registered as "Standard Bred Silver Black Foxes," "Imported Bred Silver Black Foxes," or simply "Enrolled Foxes," the latter class being eligible for registry in either of the two registers.

In the following explicit terms Article 13 of the Constitution and By-laws defines the three classes:—

Registration and Classification.

The Rules for Classification, Registration, and Enrolment of all foxes owned by members of this Association, shall be as follows:

Section 1.

The Prince Edward Island Standard Bred Silver Black Fox Register. This Association shall open a Register for the registration of native bred Prince Edward Island silver black foxes, for those that meet the requirements laid down in the following rules of admission to this Register. This Register shall be known as "The Prince Edward Island Standard Bred Silver Black Fox Register."

Qualifications for Registration.

Rule 1. For the purpose of establishing a standard of breeding for Prince Edward Island Silver Black Foxes, any silver black fox bred and held in captivity in Prince Edward Island prior to JUNE FIRST in the YEAR 1910, shall be considered Foundation Stock, and shall be eligible to registry in the Standard Bred Register, provided that each parent was a true silver black.

Rule 2. Any silver black fox bred in captivity after 1910 shall be eligible to registry in the Standard Bred Register, provided that the sire and the dam were mated previous to JUNE FIRST, 1910 and produced a litter of pups that are registered as Foundation Stock.

Rule 3. Any native Prince Edward Island bred silver black fox shall be eligible to registry in the Standard Bred Register provided that for three generations all members in both the direct and collateral lines are true silver blacks.

Rule 4. Any silver black fox shall be eligible to registry in the Standard Bred Register whose progenitors for three generations are true silver blacks and whose sire or dam is a Standard Bred Registered fox provided that either the sire or dam in each mating in the second and third generation each is a Standard Bred Registered fox and that for the three generations all members in both the direct and collateral lines are true silver blacks.

Rule 5. Any silver black fox whose sire and dam are recorded in the Standard Bred Register shall be eligible to registry in the Standard Bred Register.

NOTE—By the term "Native Prince Edward Island Silver Black Fox," shall be understood a silver black fox that is exclusively the descendant of those foxes native to the Province, or of those that were owned and held in captivity in the Province prior to JUNE FIRST, 1910.

Section 2.

The Imported Ranch Bred Silver Black Fox Register. This Association shall also open a Register for the registration of ranch bred silver black foxes that meet the requirements set down in the following rules. This Register shall be known as "The Imported Ranch Bred Silver Black Fox Register."

Qualifications for Registration. Rule 1. Any silver black ranch bred fox, wholly or in part of imported strains, not eligible for registration in the Standard Class, shall be eligible to registry in the Imported Ranch Bred Register, provided that the parents and the grand-parents are silver black ranch bred foxes.

Rule 2. Any silver black fox whose sire and dam are recorded in the Imported Ranch Bred Register shall be eligible to registry in the Imported Ranch Bred Register.

Should it be ascertained that any fox recorder in either the Standard Bred or the Imported Ranch Bred Registers, ever produced, when mated with a fox of its own class, offspring showing red or rust, the Registrar shall cancel the certificate and expunge the records from the books of the Association.

Section 3.

Enrolment Book.

An enrolment Book shall be kept in which shall be recorded the age, sex, present and previous ownership, identification mark, place of birth, description and breeding, if known, of all foxes owned by members other than those registered in either of the two Registers of the Association.

Qualifications for Enrolment.

All foxes owned by members of the Association, other than those registered in either the Standard Bred Register or the Imported Ranch Bred Register shall have their pedigrees recorded in the Enrolment Book.

Section 4.

Description.

The description of the fox shall state to what variety of fox the animal belongs, and shall note any abnormalities. No fox shall be described as "Silver Black" whose coat shows red or rusty hairs.

It shall be the duty of the Inspector to view each fox and place his identification number on each, and at the same time satisfy himself that the animal so marked corresponds with the description contained in the application form, which shall be filed by the Secretary.

The Rules and Regulations governing the application for registration and membership have been adopted from the National Live Stock Record Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. The pedigree is to be attested to by the breeder, and all transfers of sale are rigidly demanded.

As all Silver Black Foxes more or less resemble one another, the Association has adopted the method of tattoo marking, practised by the American Hereford Cattle Breeders' Association. When an application for registration is accepted by the Executive Committee a number, to be tattooed with indelible non-poisonous ink, on the left ear of the fox, so that the Inspector may be able at any time to identify registered or enrolled foxes. One of the letters X, Y, and Z, is prefixed to the identification number for the purpose of showing to what class the animal belongs—X being the letter for Standard Bred Silver Foxes, Y for Imported Ranch Bred Silver Foxes, and Z for Enrolled Foxes.

REGISTER OF THE IMPORTED RANCH BRED REGISTER

shall have their pedigrees recorded in the Enrolment Book.

Section 4. Description.

The description of the fox shall state to what variety of fox the animal belongs, and shall note any abnormalities. No fox shall be described as "Silver Black" whose coat shows red or rusty hairs.

It shall be the duty of the Inspector to view each fox and place his identification number on each, and at the same time satisfy himself that the animal so marked corresponds with the description contained in the application form, which shall be filed by the Secretary.

The Rules and Regulations governing the application for registration and membership have been adopted from the National Live Stock Record Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. The pedigree is to be attested to by the breeder, and all transfers of sale are rigidly demanded.

As all Silver Black Foxes more or less resemble one another, the Association has adopted the method of tattoo marking, practised by the American Hereford Cattle Breeders' Association. When an application for registration is accepted by the Executive Committee a number, to be tattooed with indelible non-poisonous ink, on the left ear of the fox, so that the Inspector may be able at any time to identify registered or enrolled foxes.

One of the letters X, Y, and Z, is prefixed to the identification number for the purpose of showing to what class the animal belongs—X being the letter for Standard Bred Silver Foxes, Y for Imported Ranch Bred Silver Foxes, and Z for Enrolled Foxes.

In conclusion let me summarize: 1st. The Silver Black Fox Breeder's Association is an Incorporated Body working under the Laws of the Province.

2nd. It has abolished the arbitrary and misleading Classification of foxes adopted by the old Association, i. e. Classes A, B, C, and D.

3rd. The new Regulations establish a Standard Class, an Imported Ranch Bred Class, and a mixed Class.

4th. The Rules and Regulations governing application for registration are adopted from the National Live Stock Record Branch of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, and Certificates of Breeding, and other proof of accuracy of pedigree are rigidly demanded.

5th. The Head Office is in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. I am, Sir, etc. W. E. CAMERON, The Registrar.

GERMAN PRINCE ACKNOWLEDGES ALLIES MUST WIN

London, August 2. (Central despatch from Northern France) I can vouch for the following interview as authentic. The Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria, while conversing with a member of the Reichstag, who was visiting the battle line in Artois said:

"I must confess I'm no longer an optimist. It will take some time before the Allies will seriously affect our position in France, but the role subsequently will be reversed. The strength and resources of the enemy are now too well organized.

"He is in a position to hold the balance in his favour, and it must be obvious to our best friends, that we are utilizing our maximum resources while the enemy is in a much improved position. He has important reserves. The new British army has had long training, and is presumably an efficient fighting machine."

THE GERMAN MILITARY MIND.

From the admirable reply to the German state paper concerning Belgium The Times omits one item that might have been effectively mentioned. It is the fact that German law, as the Vorwaerts of Berlin pointed out early in the war, expressly requires German civilians to make a resistance to an invader similar to that which the Germans say it was a crime against international law for Belgians to make German law requires civilian Germans, in defence of their land, to "snipe," to harass the enemy by night attacks, to interfere with his transport, to do all things that may contribute to his expulsion. Yet Germany acknowledges that she peremptorily executed many Belgians, scores without trial, for doing no more than she demands of her citizens.

The Hague rules that distinguish between the rights of combatants in uniform and combatants without uniform also forbid such an invasion of Belgium as Germany made. The rules must be constructed together. Germany may not violate one rule and then strictly demand the observance of the other. The Hague rule against the non-participation of the non-uniformed in military effort was not intended by its authors to justify such conduct in Belgium as Germany confesses to. The object was not to increase, but to lessen, the horrors of war.

BOYS AT FRONT WANT ISLAND BATTERY

The following interesting letter has been received by Captain W. B. Prowse, who is now forming an Island Battery for the front, from Sergeant F. R. Harper of this city, who is now somewhere in France:

Dear Mr. W. B. Prowse:— Just thought I would write you a few lines to let you know that I am still in the land of the living and also in the best of health. Everett Buchanan of Montague gave me a Island paper dated June 19th. I saw your ad in the paper about sending an all Island Unit to the front.

Well, Mr. Prowse I think it would be a fine thing, for everywhere you go you find some body from P. E. Island and none of us can say well I belong to the battery from P. E. Island. Some of the boys are in the artillery. Others in the infantry. I was talking to Geo. Brant, he is in the 1st Battalion C. F. A., and also Dick Brant and a young fellow by the name of Vernon McLeod, Geo. Gardiner, young Whitlock, Large and Weeks. They all look fine. I see him quite often and all the boys are in the 3rd Brigade who came over with me in the 24th battery.

You know we came over to England as a separate brigade of our own but when we got to Shorncliffe they formed us into three reserve depot batteries. They broke up the 21st, 22nd and 24th batteries and ammunition column and sent us over to France to reinforce the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Brigades of the First Continent.

I belong to the 3rd Brigade Ammunition Column in charge of Captain W. A. McKee from Charlottetown. There is not much doing out here. Just now the weather is beautiful and you can talk about farms, but here is where they are—everything but the dwellings are not up to much. It is getting hardly stable hour now and I must close for the horses got to be fed. On active service your horse and your rifle are your best friend, and I hope by the time you get this letter you will have a complete battery from P. E. Island, and believe me, we need them all right out here and the quicker they get here the better. The new style of dress now-a-days is khaki, not a big white collar and tie. It is plenty time to wear them when England has put militarism down and out forever more.

Remember me to all the boys, Billie, George and Reg. Ramsay and tell them that I am somewhere in France with two blankets and a rubber sheet for a house and in the best of health. Give a huck to you and your battery from good old P. E. I. Write soon and please excuse paper and pencil. I remain Yours truly, No. 85963, Sergt. F. R.
