Oil Drilling Delayed - Drilling operations at an exploratory oil well in Hillsboro Bay are still at a standstill. It was learned yesterday. No drilling has been done since mid-December when the hole had reached 3,700 feet. Much of the delay has been caused by difficulty in travelling between Charlottetown and the drilling site in the Bay, seven miles away. The oil men are equipped with a small half-track vehicle, which is used in place of wheels in front. It is said to be very efficient for winter travel but it is only recently that the ice in the bay provided a good surface for traffic. Last night it was learned that it was still "indefinite" when drilling would be resumed. Some work is going forward at the site in the morning. No additional damage has been done to the equipment supporting the drilling equipment since early in the winter.
