Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any other over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

1. Applicant must be a Canadian citizen and of legal age.

2. Applicant must be a bona fide settler and intend to reside on the land for a period of three years.

3. Applicant must have a bona fide intention to reside on the land for a period of three years.

S. S. Harland SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

September 23.
DANIEL IN THE LION'S DEN.
(Daniel 6:10-23.)

Golden Text.—"The Angel of the Lord encampeth round about them that fear him and delivereth them."—Psa. 34:7.

The events in our lesson occurred many years after those of last Sunday's lesson. The Babylonian empire has come to an end, having been conquered by the Medes and Persians. Nebuchadnezzar and four successors have died and Daniel is now an old man, occupying a position of honor and responsibility in the court of King Darius, of the Medo-Persian Empire. King Darius appointed one hundred and twenty princes over the people, and over these princes three presidents, of whom Daniel was first in the King's favor. A conspiracy was formed among the two other presidents of the princes to ruin Daniel, whose popularity with the King had aroused their jealousy. Not being able to

If we do not set aside certain times, we shall soon discover that we have no time. Every physician will advise his patient to have certain times for meals, and certain times for rest and for sleep. Regularity is essential to the formation of habit, and the formation of habit is the way to develop character. For action oft repeated becomes habit, and habit long continued becomes second nature. Prayer will never become second nature by fitful indulgence on occasions of special stress.

Tree Talk!
About nine million acres out of a total of 210 million acres in Quebec Province are under agricultural development. The chief crop of the remaining 200 million acres is and will always be thicker for the reason that the soil is unfitted for tillage.

More than two thirds of the technical foresters in Canada in 1914 have seen military service at the front. The enlistment of forest rangers has likewise been heavy.

The use of hydro-aeroplanes for detection of forest fires is being con-

sidered by certain governmental and private interests in Canada.

In order to save for the Indians of Canada their large timber holdings against loss by forest fires, the Indian Department at Ottawa is obliging licensees to pile and burn their slash after taking the logs out of the woods. The precaution will save numerous bad fires.

While Canada spends about four millions yearly in studying agricultural problems, only a trifling sum has been spent thus far on the study of forest problems. More than two thirds of the whole of Canada is better adapted for growing than anything else and will pay profits according to the scientific care bestowed on it.
