**Crop Outlook**

(Canadian Press)  
WINNIPEG Man, June, 24 Rainfall in practically all the crop growing district of western Canada during the past week has materially changed the general outlook although at some points the rainy period was followed by hot winds which to a considerable extent deprived the crops of the total value of the moisture received.

In Manitoba conditions are at present excellent but in Saskatchewan and Alberta the rains only supplied sufficient moisture for present condition and if any average crop is to be harvested more rain at an early date is a necessity, according to the weekly report issued by the Department of Agriculture Canadian National Railways.

In Manitoba conditions during the past week have been much more favorable for growth than at any time since seeding was completed. Some reseeded has been necessary on account of damage wrought by high winds on soil of the lighter variety. From several districts in this province come reports of wheat being in shot blade, but barely and oats are a little late due to the poor growth made in the hot weather of the past weeks.

Some damage from cutworms has been reported but from no point has the damage been serious. Wild oats have made rapid growth and some districts are badly infected with this weed, on the whole farmers in Manitoba are well satisfied with present prospects.

Southern Saskatchewan had variable weather, winds predominating at times, followed by heavy showers. These showers have prevented a continuance of soil drifting but it is too much to expect that the moisture will promote the entire recovery of grain on land which has blown wheat acreage which was damaged on the central butte subdivision has now been resown to oats and the rain received immediately following reseeded has been beneficial in central Saskatchewan. Along the Dodsland, Asquith, Craik subdivision grain is somewhat patchy and a considerable amount of harvest. Northern Saskatchewan was visited by rains which have but a different complexion on crop prospects.

All grains are showing rapid growth with wheat fully a foot higher in numerous places. Cutworm activities are reported along the Tuttleford, Amiens, Ducklake, Elme, Lake Subdivisions, but the ravages from this pest are not serious. No evidence of the presence of take-all of wheat is yet

reported from any districts, sufficient moisture has been received for the present requirements but more rain is necessary if a better than average crop is to be harvested.

In Alberta some of the districts which were in dire need of rain now state that with the moisture received in the past week prospects for a fifty to seventy-five percent crop are now practically assured provided no damage from hail wind or insect pests develops.

North central Alberta, received heavy rains, crops have made a remarkable recovery and general conditions point to the harvesting of an average crop. In south, central Alberta centering on three hills, high winds and soil drifting have prevailed, fields being damaged from forty to fifty percent. More moisture is therefore badly needed not only promote normal crop growth but to improve pasture. The Peace River country has sufficient moisture for some considerable time and precipitation in the high prairie district was so heavy that flood damage is reported, warm weather in the Peace River is now desired.

Generous receipts of plan washy grass fed cattle have been the means of forcing prices to lower levels and prospects are that no price strength will develop until animal's arriving at central stock yard, show a distinct improvement in quality and finish. The feeder hog division has been showing strength, while finished hogs have been rapidly snapped up at prices slightly lower than a week ago.

**THE PREPARATION AND SEEDING OF LAWNS.**

(Experimental Farms Note)

Perhaps no other expenditure gives such big returns in enhancing the beauty and attractiveness of the farm home than that made in the proper preparation and seeding of the lawns immediately adjoining the residence.

At the Dominion Experimental Station, Kapuskasing, Ontario, it has been found that good drainage is one of the first and most important requisites in the preparation of the land for a lawn, because no matter what mixture is used, it will not stand long periods covered with ice and water in the spring of the year.

After good drainage the next essential is a deep, mellow, smooth and fine seed-bed. This is rather difficult to obtain in heavy clay and unless the surface soil is of a loamy nature it is usually advisable to cover the clay with a few inches of dark soil such as loam or muck and thoroughly mix this with the clay by disking and harrowing.

When the surface is finally smoothed off it may be seeded with Kentucky blue grass (Poa pratensis) white Dutch clover (Trifolium repens) at the rate of 70 pounds per acre of the former and 2 pounds of the latter.

Both these plants have creeping rootstocks, and, when once established, a lawn seeded with this mixture will stand an immense amount of traffic and still retain a good appearance.

It must be remembered, however, that a lawn needs some attention even after it is established, in the way of mowing and an occasional application of artificial or other fertilizer.

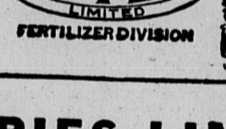
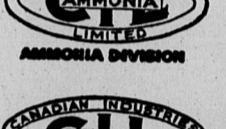
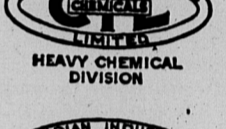

Mr. Miles said there is a strong wave of sentiment in the West Indies for a closer trade relationship with Canada. The new Canadian National West Indian steamer service has tended greatly to help to develop this friendly sentiment.

Mr. Miles and family travelled by the Canadian National steamship Lady Hawkins, one of the finest passenger and freight steamers sailing to and from the Caribbean. The accommodation and service on board are all that could be desired, the passengers on the trip being unanimous in their expression of appreciation of the splendid manner in which both officers and crew discharged their duties.

The West Indies are convinced to a large extent that their future is built up in commerce with Canada. At present their sugar gets in at a dollar preference over foreign sugar, but there is still 28c duty against them. If that 28c could be taken off, and West India sugar get free access to Canada, the West Indian Governments would go a long way to give Canada exclusive preference in other directions. The feeling is growing that the West Indies and Canada are natural complements and should act fiscally accordingly.

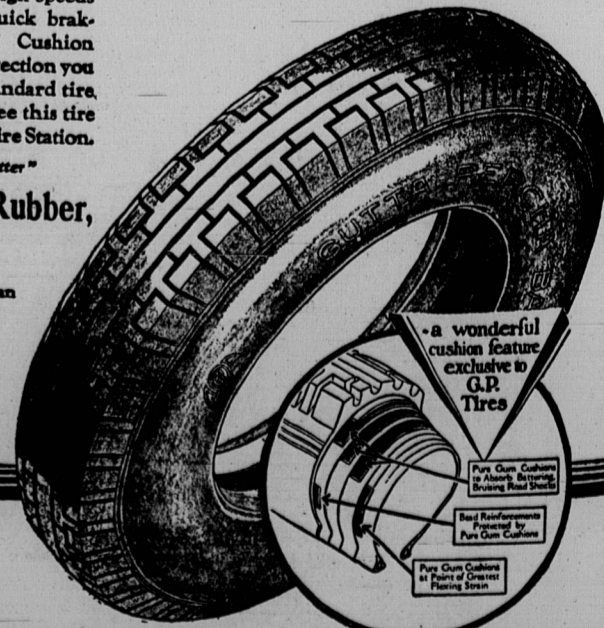
