There is every hope of his recovery.

PHYSICAL TRAINING PRIZES.—The award of the prizes given annually by the Strathcona Trust Commission for physical training in the schools of the province has been made for the past year. For the purpose of making the award, the province is divided into five groups. No 1 being the schools of Charlottetown & Summerside; No 2 being all the first class schools outside of these places; No 3, all other schools in Prince County; Inspectorate; No 4, those in the Central group; and No 5, those in the Kings County Inspectorate. The prizes, which are of money, are divided equally between the physical instructor of the school and as follows:—No 1 group—First prize, Prince Street School; 2nd, prize, Queen Square School. (No third prize was awarded in this district.) No 2 group—first prize, Souris High School; 2nd, Alberton High School; 3rd, Kensington High School. No 3 group—first prize, Darnley School; 2nd, Urbanville School; 3rd, Spring Valley School. No 4 group—first prize, Vernon River School; 2nd, Alexandra School; 3rd, Hermitage School. No 5 group—first prize, New Perth School; 2nd, St. Patrick's Road School; 3rd, St. Mary's Road School.

BUSINESS AND PLEASURE.—Mr. J. F. Fraser, of Davis & Fraser, Halifax, who has been in the city for the past two days, left yesterday by the afternoon express to spend a few days at his old home at Elmira. Mr. Fraser besides being Business Manager of the well-known pork-packing business conducted at Halifax and Charlottetown by his firm, is also President of The Island Cold Storage Company, whose extensive plant, by the way, is a point of more absorbing interest than generally realized. These two establishments working in conjunction have done, and are doing much in a quiet way to enhance the standard, and the market value, of agricultural products, the result of which is felt by every producer with whom they, either directly or indirectly have business dealings. It is understood that it is the intention of Mr. Fraser, before returning to Halifax, to discuss with different Institutes the prospect and possibilities of increasing the supply of hogs to a point more in keeping with the ever-growing demand for the finished product, and in these days when so much is heard about encouraging home industry, it may safely be assumed that Mr. Fraser's efforts in this direction will meet with a sympathetic response from the farmers of his native province.
